Purchases Nearly Completed With Only 15 More Sales to Be Consummated. Speculation as to Plans.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company has nearly completed the purchase of all property on the north side of Filhert street, and the south side of Cuthbert atreet, from 15th to 20th street in the Ninth ward, needed to complete the location of its enlarged terminal and additional trackage.

At this date, only is properties are on the books of the city with registered owners other than the railroad company. Many properties have been acquired at very reasonable figures; others it was freemed boar.


