AUSTRIAN ARMIES PUSH INTO POLAND, LOCAL CONSUL SAYS

Joining Germans, There, Combined Force Drives Russians Across Vistula in Bloody Battle.

The Austro-Hungarian army has pushed its way into Russian Poland, according to an official communication received today from the Foreign Office in Vienna at the Austro-Hungarian Consulate in this city. The official message says that the Russians were defeated in a bloody battle near the Vistula River in the vicinity of Cracow and were driven across the river.

The Germans have joined the Austro-Hungarian armies and are alding them against the Russians in this section. It is announced also that the combined Austrian and German forces have taken Bridghold, which is about 16 miles over the border into Russian Poland. In Galicia the statement says that the enemy has been repulsed at Tarnobrzeg.

The official statement is as follows:

The Russians have been repulsed in an attempt to cross the Vistula. The Austro-Hungarian and German forces are successfully fighting shoulder to shoulder in Russian Poland, where their sudden advance seems to have completely surprised the enemy. Our forces have taken Bridghold, near Sandomir, about 16 miles into Russian Poland.

"Our advance into Galicia is being carried on systematically. A large division of Russian infantry was repulsed by us at Tarnobrzeg. The defeat of the enemy in the Carpathians is complete."
