



ALLIES' CAVALRY DRIVES BACK FOES IN FIERCE CHARGES

Mounted French and British Fight Way North of Lille and Engage Strong German Force, According to Official Statement From Paris.

That the Allies are meeting with continued success in their flanking movement near the Franco-Belgian border is indicated by the official statement issued at 3 o'clock this afternoon...

Continued success marks the Allies' campaign to check the flanking movement on their extreme left by the Germans. A fierce cavalry engagement now is in progress north of Lille...

The general situation has undergone no change. On our left wing the two cavalry forces are operating continually at the north of Lille and La Carre...

German War Office announces the capture of another Antwerp fort and continued progress near St. Mihiel, on the Meuse, and in the Ardennes region.

At the centre, from the Oise to the Meuse, there are only minor engagements. On our right, in the Woivre region, there has been an artillery battle along the entire front...

Russia's new army has advanced to within 30 miles of Thorn, the heavily fortified Silesian city, which is the key to Posen and Berlin.

In Bosnia the Montenegrin troops continue their advance in the direction of Sarajevo, having reached the fortified line which protects the city at a distance of eight kilometers (about five miles).

Montenegrins have taken three Bosnian towns in their sweeping movement toward Sarajevo.

A dispatch from Bordeaux, the seat of the French Government, to the Paris Figaro says: "An orderly German retreat, accompanied by violent fighting, seems to have begun from heavy transfers of troops from the north of the Aisne to northern France."

Details of Play

A great roar of applause burst from the stands when the announcer pronounced the name of Chief Bender, Connie Mack's choice to bring victory to Philadelphia in the first game of the 1914 world's baseball championship series.

At 1:20 o'clock the Braves, who had been warming up for half an hour, took the field for practice. Their hitting was not as terrific as the Athletics, but the precision with which they met the ball surprised many local fans who had never before seen in action to date the ability of the Mackmen to outwit their rivals.
