

The Germantown arch is to be dedicated tomorrow and the Episcopal church on October 18. Archoishop Prendergast will delicate the Church of St. Catharine of Sienna, while at 10 o'clock temorrow morning. The ser-mon will be preached by Monsignor Charles F. Kavanagh, chancellor of the archdiocese. On Wednesday Bishon Moort consecrated the altar, and relics of Candidus and St. Victorine were

The design of the Germantown edifice conforms to that of the old Spanish missions of California. The walls are of white plaster on stone, with the windows recessed into arched openings and with verhanging caves and red tiled roof.
