Wife Says Spouse Assaulted Her and Attacked Neighbor.

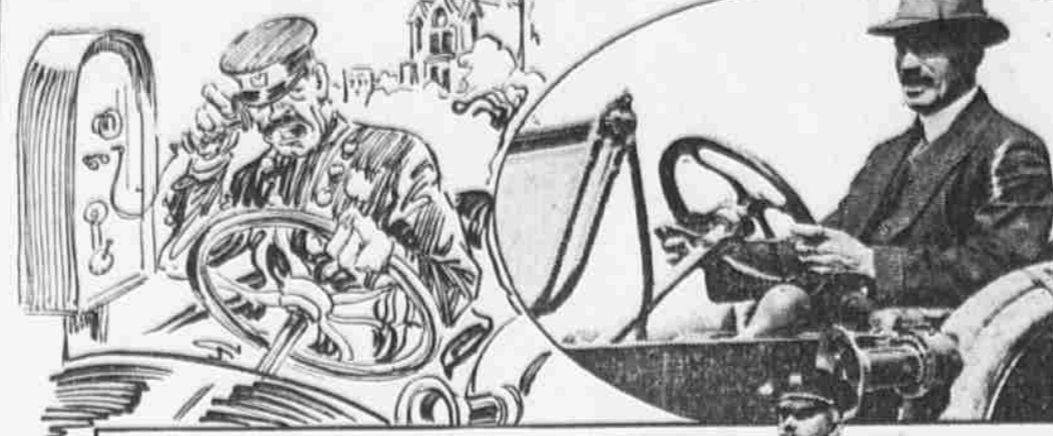

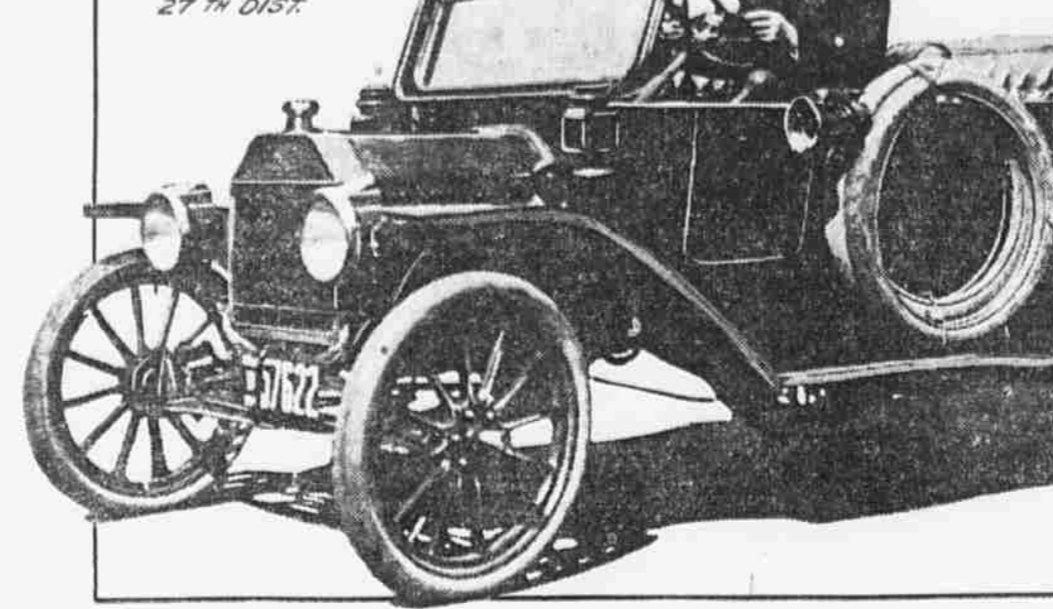
Charles Hornsby Responds to Treatment After Collapse at Shibe Park

PHILADELPHIA POLICEMAN'S FANCY TURNS TO AUTOMOBILE

Nearly Thirty Members of Blue-Coated Band Forego Habits of Thrift to Buy Motorcars and Attain Delight of Driving Them.

BRYAN AND STRAUS HERE TONIGHT FOR BIG PEACE MEETING

Mayor Will Preside and Prominent Clergymen Form Committee in Charge of Convention Hall Demonstration.

Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan and former Secretary of Commerce and Labor Oscar S. Straus will arrive at Broad Street Station at 7 o'clock this evening to speak on the subject of international peace in Convention Hall, Broad street and Allegheny avenue.

Mr. Bryan and Mr. Straus will be met at the station by a committee consisting of the Rev. Dr. J. R. Sutherland, a Presbyterian minister; Rabbi Henry Berkowitz, and Thomas H. McCaffrey, a prominent Catholic layman.

Tonight's meeting will be called to order by Doctor Sutherland at 8:15 o'clock. It will be strictly non-partisan and non-sectarian, and is expected to prove one of the most successful demonstrations ever held for world-wide peace and probably the largest.

Doctor Sutherland will turn the meeting over to Mayor Blankenship, the permanent chairman. Secretary Bryan will make the first address after the opening prayer by Doctor Roberts.

The police band will play at the opening. "America" will be sung and at the close "The Star-Spangled Banner."

Following the arrival of the distinguished guests, they will be taken to the Bellevue-Stratford and entertained at dinner by the Reception Committee.

Three hundred and fifty Boy Scouts will be in uniform, and will be on duty to take charge of the crowds fully an hour before the speaking begins.

DEMOCRATS IN CITY RENT BY DISCORD, ON VERGE OF SPLIT

Party Leaders Fail to Patch Up Differences With Old Guard—Reorganizers Name Magistrate Slate.

Factional discord in the local Democracy threatens to break out anew, despite the efforts of the party leaders to patch the differences so that a united front may be presented on November 3.

Of the 13 men already chosen as candidates for the vacancies, not one is in sympathy with the Old Guard faction of the party. Two more names are to be agreed upon later, and these, too, will be allied with the reorganizers, according to those who are arranging the slate.

Eight of the present 25 Magistrates were elected on the Democratic ticket. But, as all of these are believed to be inclined toward the Old Guard, not one of their names is mentioned for re-election although it is probable that each will run.

"No place for the Old Guard followers and no fusion" is the motto of those who have drawn the slate. Their position on fusion follows as a logical result of the election last year, when three fusion Washington party men, and not a single Democrat, was placed in office. Since that time W. Maxwell Stevenson, one of those elected as a result of the fusion movement, has deserted the Washington party and aligned himself with Penrose.

Fifteen Magistrates are to be elected in 1915. According to a State law ten of these must be Republicans, the majority party. The other five will be divided between the Washington and the Democratic parties, the number of which candidates in each party will be determined by the comparative vote polled by each in the election this year.

It is the plan of those who are arranging the reorganization slate to put 15 candidates in the Democratic column, and the nominations of whatever number will be credited to the Democratic party.
