CITY MISSION SUNDAY IN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCHES

Special Services Will Be Held Tomorrow for Advancement of Cause. Tomorrow is to be observed by Presbyterian clergymen in all parts of the city as "City Mission Sunday." In the interests of the wider campaign of the city mission and church extension work. In almost all the churches there will be special services for the purpose of encouraging the congregations to cooperate with the campaign that is being waged by the Philadelphia Presbytery. To further increase interest in the home missionary work, a special meeting of the Presbytery is to be held in Calvary Church, 15th and Locust streets, on November 9. There will be afternoon and evening sessions and prominent clergymen and laymen will speak on the plans. The churches of this city are expected to contribute \$40,000 as their share of the general missionary budget of the home missionary cause. Of this sum 60 per cent is to be used for local work. It is also hoped to obtain \$100,000 to pay off mortgages on all missions and churches desiring assistance.

SOCIALIST LITERARY SOCIETY

Winter Course Will Open Tomorrow in Broad Street Theatre. The Socialist Literary Society will open its annual winter meetings in the Broad Street Theatre tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock. The speaker at this service will be Morris Hiquist, chairman of the Socialist Party and secretary of the International Socialist Bureau. His subject will be "The Mission and Prospects of Socialism." There will be a series of lectures, each of which will begin at 3 o'clock on Sunday afternoon. The list of speakers includes Dr. S. Woods Hutchinson, Charles Howard Russell, the author of "The Social Basis of the State," Reginald Wright Kauffman and other well-known writers and thinkers, who are active in the Socialist movement in this country.

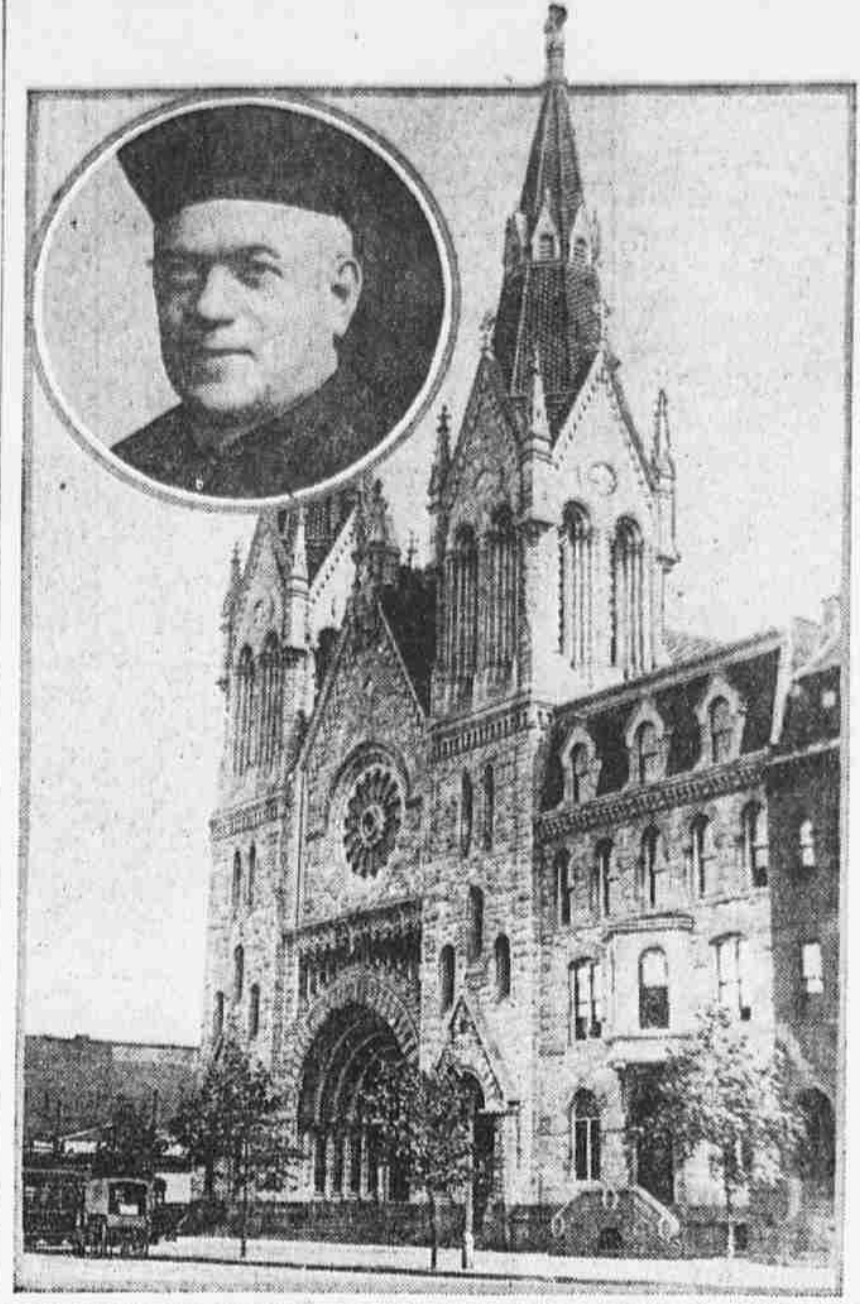

OUR LADY OF MERCY CELEBRATION TO BE HELD TOMORROW

Twenty-fifth Anniversary of the Rector's Pastorate and of the Building of the Church. A triple celebration is to take place in the Catholic Church of Our Lady of Mercy, Broad street and Susquehanna avenue, tomorrow. The Rev. Gerald P. Coghlan, rector of the church, will celebrate his 25th anniversary as pastor and the 25th anniversary of his ordination, and the 25th anniversary of the church edifice will also be observed. With Archbishop Prendergast in attendance as the guest of honor, a Solemn High Mass will be celebrated by the Rev. Mr. Coghlan in the morning. He will be assisted by the Rev. M. V. Reising and the Rev. William F. Gaughan, and the Rev. Charles W. Lyons, president of Boston College, will preach the sermon. In anticipation of this event the interior of the church has undergone extensive repairs and has been completely renovated. It is one of the most beautiful in the archdiocese, and its front looks much like the famous cathedral at Rheims, which was destroyed by German bombs a few weeks ago. The Rev. Mr. C. Coghlan has had a most successful career. He was born in Ireland at Foxford on July 4, 1848, and after receiving his early education in his home diocese he came to America in 1868. His education was completed in St. Charles Seminary, and on October 13, 1872, he was ordained to the priesthood. After serving as an assistant in the First Presbyterian Church, 3d street and Tabor road, this service is also to mark the tenth anniversary of the "pleasant hour" meeting and the forty anniversary of the Brotherhood of the church. On Monday night he will address the men of Roxborough and vicinity in the Lovington Presbyterian Church. Last night he spoke to the men of Kensington in the East Baptist Church. Already Mr. Dowe has assurances that more than 1000 "trail-hitters" will be willing to come here to occupy local pulpits on October 25. The plan is to bring the army of 1000 men to Philadelphia on a special train, every member of the crew of which is a Sunday convert. The train is to arrive at the Reading Terminal just before midnight next Saturday evening, and the men may parade through the city streets and utter in singing some of the inspiring revival hymns used in the Sunday meetings on the north plaza at the City Hall before dark. A banquet will follow the demonstration in the armory of the State Fencibles, Broad and Vine streets. SUNDAY SCHOOL CENTENARY

Observance Will Open Teachers' Institute in Old Christ Church. A celebration of the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Sunday school in the United States, in Old Christ Church, 2d and Market streets, will open the 47th annual meeting and Teachers' Institute of the Sunday School Association of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, at the forenoon. Boynton, of the General Theological Seminary, New York, and Dr. Enoch W. Pearson, director of music in the Philadelphia public schools. In the evening Bishop Rhinelander will preside, and the Rev. George H. Toop, rector of the Church of the Holy Apostles, and the Rev. Charles S. Lewis, rector of St. Mar's Church, Burlington, N. J., will speak.

A. J. DREXEL BIDDLE WILL LEAD BIBLE CLASS RALLY

Chief Speaker at Big Cincinnati Meeting October 25. A. J. Drexel Biddle, founder of the Drexel Biddle Bible Classes, will be the chief speaker in Cincinnati, O., on Sunday, October 25, when a whirlwind campaign rally will be inaugurated in that city and vicinity. It is planned to make the mass-meeting that evening the largest the Bible classes have ever held. More than 100 clergymen are to occupy seats on the platform, and it is hoped to have more than 5000 persons in attendance. Miss Olive May Wilson, the "Santa Claus Girl," and E. J. Rankin are to be the speakers at the Drexel Biddle class meeting at Plymouth Meeting tomorrow afternoon.

NEW EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Parish of St. Simon the Cyrenian Will Be Dedicated Tomorrow. The beautiful new Protestant Episcopal Church of St. Simon the Cyrenian, 22d and Reed streets, erected for the use of the Negroes of South Philadelphia, is to be dedicated tomorrow by Bishop Rhinelander. The dedicatory services will take place in the morning, and the Rev. John R. Logan, rector, has made elaborate preparations for them. The church cost about \$20,000, and is one of the finest Episcopal churches for Negroes in the Diocese of Pennsylvania.
