Inventory of Prominent Philadelphia's Estate Filed Today—Many Investments in Utilities Companies.

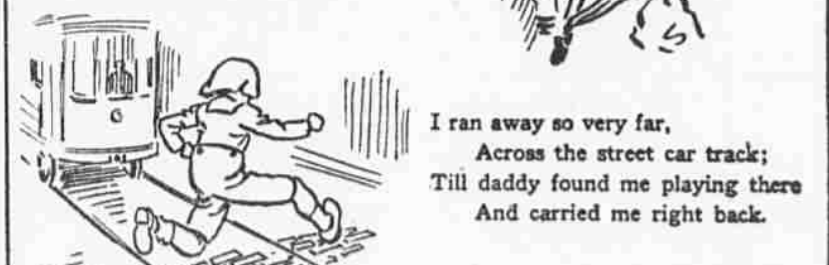

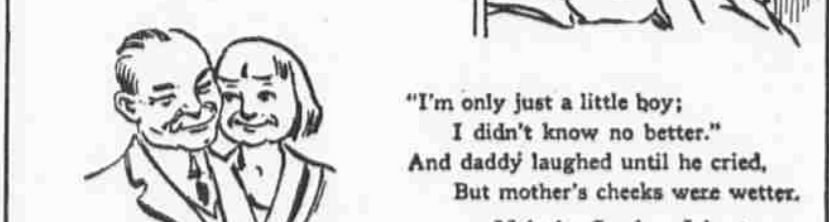

AGED SEXTON FOUND DEAD ON CHURCH WINDOW LEDGE

Workmen Discover Body of James Rollo, Employee of Fashionable Congregation.

James Rollo, the aged assistant sexton of the Second Presbyterian Church, 21st and Walnut streets, was found dead today on a window ledge in the edifice.

Rollo was nearly 70 years old. He was said to have a home near 9th and Vine streets. About a month ago he shuffled into the church, preaching to a work.

William S. Magner, the sexton took pity on the aged man and hired him to help about the place.

It was put to work dusting pews and doing other minor tasks. Occasionally he complained of a pain in the region of his heart.

Last night as was his custom, the old man made his rounds of the building. When workmen saw Rollo this morning they thought he was asleep.

"Get up, old man," they said, and shook him. Dr. Alfred Haverford, 124 Pine street, who came to the church, said the aged sexton had been dead for several hours.

The trip is the result of a unanimous vote of the seniors to substitute an out-of-town trip for the class-day exercises usually held during commencement week, and they expect the plan to be a success.

There were tall girls and short girls, blondes and brunettes among the enthusiasts, who filled the four cars on the special train.

An automobile trip around Washington will be made by the seniors upon their arrival in Washington. After the tour they will take luncheon at the Hotel Gordon and spend the afternoon in the Congressional Art Gallery and Pan-American Union.

Tomorrow's program includes visits to the Treasury, State, War and Navy buildings, and the trip to Arlington Cemetery, where they will remain until 2:30, when they will leave for Mount Vernon to take a steamer for Washington.

On Saturday the Washington Monument, Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Smithsonian Institution, Old and New National Galleries and the White House will be visited, after which the special train which will bring them back to this city.
