OPERATIC SOCIETY

"Carmen" Splendidly Done by Amateurs at the Academy.

One of Arnold Bennett's people says, somewhere, that outside of Wagner there is but one great opera which has a great libretto, and that is "Carmen." The production by the Philadelphia Operatic Society last night was ample proof. "Carmen" is so fine that it is amateur-proof, it is almost beyond human power to spoil it, but the talented amateurs of the society showed to a remarkable extent how fine it could be made.

In the first place, it was well produced—the staging was adequate, the little misfortunes of amateur work were surprisingly absent, the ensemble movements were well executed and the costuming was tastefully done. Then the acting was unusual, not only for amateur performances. The acting demands which "Carmen" makes on its singers are greater perhaps than that of any other opera, and the stars last night satisfied those demands to the last detail. Finally, the singing was good, and the dancing was good. What more could be asked?

Individual honors went to Miss Vivienne Segal from the moment she made her captivating appearance. Miss Segal's interpretation of the part was more brilliant than Merimee. She was too pleasing, not half vicious enough. But the fit in her voice and in her movements was so thoroughly fresh, an incarnation of Henley's "wanton and wondrous and forever well" that one forgave the sweetness which should not have been. Miss Segal's voice is a rich but not too powerful mezzo-soprano; its weakness came out in the dance song of the second act, for example. But it was well sustained, and, considering that the singer had to struggle with the English libretto, it was rather wonderful. Mr. Rothermel's Don Jose was acted with a certain humor, but his voice was cloudy at times, and only in his bravura passages showed its strength. Horace Hood as Escamillo roared the Toreador song in splendid voice and character, and Adeline Patti Near as Nicolsa and Adele Hassan as Frasquita gave careful interpretations of their parts. The individuals were all so good that to mark out certain ones seems invidious. Those, however, in the star parts, were stars. Wassili Leps conducted the opera with fine result.

The extraordinary thing was that this performance fell short in a way utterly unknown before. Most amateur operas are faulty because they imitate professionals too much. The direction of this performance, in a praise-worthy attempt to escape the obvious, erred by excess of zeal. They forgot that at a given moment their street in Seville becomes no longer a street but the apron of a stage on which a man is singing a lyric. So, in the first act, bits of genre work by the chorus effectually spoiled one of Mr. Rothermel's arias. The members of the chorus passed in and out of the interesting beauty behind him while he sang. The idea was not at fault, but the execution.

And quite apart from the merits of this production, last night gave arrest argument in the matter of opera in English. When singers have to struggle with "Love you not me, love I then you," and have to make it "I am Carmelita's song," it can be truly said that the greatest enemies of opera in English are the operas now in English.

The effect of the war in this respect, as to whether it will force managers to discover new talent or cause incipient genius to assert itself, will be interesting to observe.
