Officials of the organization are con fident they will have close to 590,000 names back of the appeal to be made to the lawmakers, asking that laws be passed to protect the homes and the future lives of the youth of the Commonwealth from the detrimental influences of llauor.

The association is following up the appeal with thousands of posters bearing the message of the temperance advocates in striking language. Orders for these and the leaflets that carry the same mes-sages are being received in every mail, and the advocates of the local option movement among the Sunday School people are jubilant with the support it is receiving.
