THE PINK LADY OFF THE STAGE

Hazel Dawn, Rosiest and Loveliest of Operetta Prima Donnas, Tells Her Secret of Health, Beauty and Happiness-A Singer Who Never "Acts".

When Ivan Caryll was writing the music of The Pink Lady," some five years ago, he was naturally anxious about getting a prima donn's adequately to interpret the bewitching blithesome butterfly who should wing her way airlly through the part to his engaging music. Then he happened to see Hasel Dawn, playing incompicuously at the Galety, in London, and he brought her to America. Of her success-one of the most sudden and striking on the stageevery one knows.
