EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 2 .- With a mixed army of more than 2000 Yaqui Indians and ex-Federal soldiers, recently mobilized In lower California, Governor Maytorens, leader of the Villa faction in northern Mexico, is approaching Naco, Mex. General Benjamin Hill, commander of the Car anza garrison defending that town, expects an attack to be made on his forces today. Jorge U. Orozco, Mexican Consul here, has telegraphed to General Villareal, president of the Aguascalientes convention, declaring Maytorena's action a violation of the armistice.

Dispatches from Mexico City state that General Carranza has not presented his General Carranza has not presented his resignation to the convention and will not do so until he is assured that the terms of his proposed retirement are complied with by Villa and Zapata. Carranza says both must retire absolutely from their military positions before he will resign. Carranza also demands assurances that when Villa and Zapata resign they must not be in position to meddle with Mexi-can politics ind that he must be informed of the sort of Provisional Government the convention delegates may adopt before he will send his resignation to them.
