### HAZEL DAWN BEGUILES IN HERBERT OPERETTA

Celebrated Composer Scores Another Success in "The Debutante"-Book Thin of Plot, But Production Lavishly Clothed and Excellently Cast.

Victor Herbert's music is most remarkable, perhaps, for its orchestration. Technically it is marvelously composed and orchestrated with the felicitous skill of the master senius. Herbert's waltzes are always incomparable, haunting, hypnotizing, with a magically melodic quality; his songs are often dreams. Herbert is,

too, a musician with a sense of humor. Luxuriously staged, with scenic settings pendulous with mammoth roses, with a chorus of stunning, almost Parisian-looking girls, gowned with ornate magnificence, replete with effective dances, waltzes and songs, and with Hazel Dawn, just reseately lovely, as star, Mr. Herbert's new operetta, "The Debutante," opened last night at the Garrick Theatre. "The Debutante" ranks with Mr. Herbert's former notable successes, and while the hand of the composer is at all times recognizable, his new work is marked by original departures in composition, and testifies to Mr. Herbert's amazing versatility and fertility.

Inconsequential as to plot, the book, written by those uninspired and becoming-wearisome ibrettists, the Smith Brothers-Harry B. and Robert B., not yet incorporated-serves merely to string together a series of incidents and situations and to give the principals the cues for singing and dancing to the music. "The Debutante" is one of the most delightfully diverting, enthrallingly entertaining and melodically pleasing musical comedies of recent years, and one of the most notable productions of the resent season.

There take part in "The Debutante" Elaine, the daughter of Sir Francis Vane, charmingly interpreted by Hazel Dawn; Godfrey Frazer, the stock humorous American captain of industry, laughably enacted by William Danforth; Philip, his son, in love with Flaine, supposedly a bounding American youth, rawther too English, youh know, by Alan Mudie; Mrs. Zenobla Bunker, an English suffragette, and her husband Ezra, composer of cubist grand opera. Maude Odell, as the vigorous suffragette, proves a corking character actress, and Will West, as her husband, puts across the greatest amount of fun in the piece.

Miss Dawn acts her part as ingenuously, as maffectedly, as naturally as when she played 'The Pink Lady." While Miss Dawn lacks all that artifice which becomes art, she is all the more insinuatingly captivating therefor. She is a subjugatingly beautiful, rosy, goldenhaired Elaine, and her rose colored gowns are simply gorgeous. Alan Mudie, as the young American, might make a more convincing hero if he learned the art of make-up and appeared with at least the simulation of such good looks as capture women's hearts.

Of the many delightful songs in the show, Miss Dawn scored hits with "Professor Cupid," "The Love of Lorell," in which Robert G. Pitkin-a ripping lieutenant of the navy-and Mr. Mudie joined, and "Call Around Again." Sylvin Jason, Mr. Pitkin and Mr. Mudle evoked the greatest number of encores with "The Baker's Boy and the Chimney Sweep," a catchy song, excellently accompanied by novel dance. Mr. Herbert's musical humoreached its high spot in "The Cubist Opera," a screaming farce sung by Will West and William Danforth. "Grand opera," declared Will West, "is tragedy set to music. The music is all on the stage-the tragedy is in the baxoffice."

A Linguistic Treat at the Forrest With an Odd and Delightful Prima Donna

Whether you dance it or see it or just try to pronounce It, the "Hazazaa" is a vastly satisfactory affair. And so is all of the new operetta at the Forrest. But before you can show your real feelings about it you need a lesson in pronunciation. For "Sari" is "Sharee" and a great many other names are as linguistically twisted. But never forget Miss Hajos. After all, she is the unique fact in the entertainment at the Forrest. There is a good "book" and better music. There is even an excellent supporting company. But the little woman who plays and dances and sings Sari into an amusing and original character-Sari, who was only a sidelight in the original Viennese libretto-is the noteworthy element. She has a voice-which is not unusual in young Europeans. She can dance-like all Americans. But, most of all, she can be funny. She can invent character.
