It Is Felt That Some Impressive Factor Is Necessary to Act as an Incentive-Increased Strength in Open Markets.

STRENGTH IN WHEAT IS DEVELOPED TODAY AT CHICAGO MARKET

Enormous Export Business, Marked Decrease in Producers' Offerings and Firm Holding Sentiment Responsible.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4-Enormous export business, a marked falling off in offerings by producers, and a decided holding sentiment caused strength in wheat today. There also was an expanding speculative due largely to a heavy run of wheat to market and a rather large discount for cash wheat here. Cash sales were 2,250,000 bushels. Fu-

ures closed 14 cent higher. Corn was strong. There was a large demand and only a limited supply for export. Current receipts of new are excellent and are likely to attract the attention of the export trade. New corn from South Dakota arrived today, grading No. yellow. Cash sales were 435,000 bushels. Cash corn was strong in the markets.
