PRECAUTIONS IN LANCASTER

Ten States Now Under Ban—Experts Say Rise in Prices of Meats Will Not Result.

PRINCIPAL POINTS OF LIVE STOCK PROBLEM

States quarantined—New York, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana, Iowa and Massachusetts. Cattle destroyed to date, about 300. Last epidemic, 1908. Cost to stamp out, \$300,000. Origin of this epidemic, Michigan. The plague among domestic animals, especially cattle, sheep, swine and goats, is characterized by sensitive sores on the tongue, palate and hoofs, according to the Department of Agriculture. The sores becoming red and raw within a very short time and cause the disease to spread to other cattle. Lameness appears and the milk ducts dry up. It takes two years to stamp out the disease, is to destroy all animals afflicted.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Federal quarantine against the foot and mouth disease of cattle today was extended to take in ten States. Experts of the Department of Agriculture have also been hurried to Mississippi to investigate conditions there, although no quarantine order against that State has been issued. This was the substance of a statement by Secretary of Agriculture Houston.
