LEHIGH CO. MAKES RECORD

14 STATES PROHIBIT SALE OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR ALTOGETHER

Four States Added to "Dry" List in Tuesday's Election. Score Have Local Option Laws.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Fourteen States now have laws prohibiting the sale of alcoholic beverages. The 14 include four States added to the "dry" list as the result of Tuesday's election. On the face of the returns prohibition has just been adopted by Arizona, Washington, Oregon and Colorado. The States which prohibit the sale of liquor are:

- Arizona, Mississippi, Tennessee, North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Ohio, North Dakota, Washington, Oklahoma, West Virginia, Nevada, Oregon.
