

# PAPIER-MACHE HERO, SAWDUST HEROINE

Dumdum Villain, War, Guns, Secret Marriage-Fustian Drama in "The Story of the Rosary,"

Some folks like caviar, some corned over and cabbage. Some take to chicken livers en brochette, others again to wienerwurst. Certain gentlemen prefer domestic pilsner to creme v'vette. Why squabble about taste? Many certainly will like "The Story of the Rosary," which opened at the Lyric Theatre last night.

"The Story of the Rosary" is a melodrama filled with saccharine emotion, stuffed straw characters, brummagem herolams, sham battles and what not. Melodrama of the old-fashioned tried and tested variety. A half dozen fat gentlemen in the audience clapped vociferously each time the termented heroir dropped a tear or imprinted a kiss; a few dried herring wept their last salt tears. We thought of the novels of Charlotte M. Braeme, Laura Jean Libbey and Charles Garvis, of Eliza crossing the ice in "Uncle Tom's Cabin," the woes of "Nellie, the Beautiful Cloak Model," and the agonized deeires of 5,000,000 women as described by the eloquent pen of Cheta Rhilde Window. Nothing in life ever happens as it is described by the Hall Corellis, Marie Caines, Owen Davises, "Little Sister" authoresses or swashbuckler melodramatists of morals, wars, emotions or economics, Hyperbole-that's the word! High-falutin, rambunctious, rip-snorting guff often gets the en-

Harken to Allen Dale, who recently left his job: "The sublime sensation of going to the theatre had returned to me. 'The Story of the Rosary' in its simplicity, its sincerity and its careful adherence to tradition-the iron-clad tradition of melodrama-got me." The celebrated author of "A Marriage Below Zero" was so entranced, so captivated, so enthralled, he did not for once daintly shake a few drops from the phial of acerbity and venom, with which he usually tinctured his toasts to so many excellent plays. Mr. Dale praised "The Story of the Rosary," as does the press agent. Yet we cannot.

Oh, yes, if you want the thrill of a loop-theloop, a Jack Rose cocktail or three, a peep into a Victoria Cross novel, a hasheesh pill or a dinner of sauer krout, neither shall we object If you wish to witness the rampant romance of a princess, "the only daughter of a rulned aristorrat," beloved by two captains of the Red Dragoons, cousins, "fast but false friends," the one actuated by Jealousy and envy (hist, the sibilant voice of the press agent!), one of whom wins the princess and marries her at midnight in a church, then goes to war, only to be arrested, and later sent forth to lead the battle, then we can recommend you to go to see "The Story of the Rosary."

The stage settings are "scrumptious." There's a real production of a stained glass church window. There's an old priest who prays in falsetto. There's a mother superior who staggers and swoons and remembers an ancient love affair. There's a heroic chap-played by the author, Walter Howard-who was fired from the army because of, well, the press agent acknowledges it a malady known at "drunkenness," and who brings to the convent-immured wife the news of her husband's death. There's the wife about to take the veil when, "as tenderly, devout words are leaving her lips, her husband approaches and folds her in his arms." Sweet, sweet!

This sort of thing is without the realm of serious dramatic criticism, even as are the works of Charles Garvice, Bertha Clay and Nick Carter. If you like this sort of thing, go t' it! It is not drama. It can't be considered seriously, old chap, youh know! It impresses, startles, makes you jump with gun expleatens, and if you're a dried herring, you
