

CIVIL WAR AGAIN
CONFRONTATION MEXICO;
CLASH SEEMS NEAR

General Outbreak of Hostilities Between Forces of Carranza and Villa Expected in 24 Hours.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 10.—Another civil war in Mexico is imminent. A general outbreak of hostilities between the armed forces of General Venustiano Carranza and General Francisco Villa is expected within 24 hours as a result of Carranza's open defiance of the demands of the leaders of the Aguascalientes peace convention. First Chief Carranza is expected to attempt to retain his executive power with the Federal army, and he has issued a proclamation to all his generals ordering them on duty for service.

General Antonio Villarreal, president of the Aguascalientes conference, arrived here early today from Cordoba, accompanied by General Alvaro Obregon, General A. Benavides and General Hays, who were working to bring General Carranza to the conference. General Hays was asked as to the future of the war. "We are going to try to do what we can," he said, "but I do not see more than that. Perhaps we are taking chances, but this is a time when every man has to do his duty. We took a big chance before, but we were wrong. General Villarreal predicted that the Aguascalientes convention would be transferred to this city within the next few days.

General Estrada, private secretary to Carranza, declares that all of Carranza's old commands will fight him. When questioned upon her attitude toward the Mayor, after the interview of last Friday, Mrs. Thomas replied: "I sincerely trust the Mayor will understand my position and realize I did not wish to offend him, but if he is not willing to do so, he can at least let the city treasury for this work be closed for others to make it available, or, failing in this, should point out some other feasible method of making public opinion accomplish the work."

Dr. C. A. Schaeffer, head of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, placed a strict quarantine on shipments from and to the yards for ten days. Only those cattle in transit will be allowed to enter the yards and no cattle will be permitted to leave.

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JIM LARKIN, MOST
PICTURESQUE FIGURE
IN LABOR ASSEMBLY

Famous Irish Agitator Vigorous Opponent of War and Scomful of Home Rule Bill.
One of the most interesting, if not the most interesting visitor at the convention of the American Federation of Labor, is James, or as he is better known throughout the world, "Jimmy" Larkin. Larkin is the Irish labor leader who was put in jail by the British Government some time ago for leading a big strike. At present he has had against him prison sentences amounting to some 15 years of hard labor. He has only served two years, and according to the British, has been in jail for a period longer than three months and 14 days. It was only after the declaration of war between England and Germany that Larkin was set free to find a place for Larkin to live in. At least the Government made it too hot for him by evincing a desire to shoot him for an anti-war patriot.

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
