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U. S. DEFENSES NEED MORE SHRAPNEL

Supply of This Country Pitiful in Comparison With Europe's—Frankford the Sole Manufacturer.

The present unpreparedness of the United States to defend herself from land attack by hostile nations, according to military men, has perhaps never before been better illustrated than today, when large corporations, knowing this Government operates only one plant for the manufacture of shrapnel complete, are either erecting or contemplating building great establishments to make artillery ammunition.

It is generally conceded by army experts in a position to know that in Europe at the present time any one of the great nations at war is firing more shrapnel in a single week than is manufactured by this Government in a year.

Coupled with this statement, Colonel Montgomery reluctantly admitted it would take the Frankford Arsenal from seven to ten years to make that number of mechanical fuses, to say nothing of shrapnel cases, at any given distance after being fired from a field piece.

It is in the manufacture of these delicate and deadly instruments the United States falls dangerously behind other nations.

RESERVE PITIFULLY INADEQUATE. To army men this condition is distressing. Many of them are unable to understand why the Government has taken no action to fortify itself against invasion. They say if a foreign Power once conquered the United States navy, this country would be paying indemnity to its antagonist at the expiration of one month.

Even Congressman Michael Donohoe, who has done much toward the enlargement of Frankford Arsenal, and has secured an increased appropriation to the end that the plant's output may be increased, admits with regret the present inadequacy of the Government reserve ammunition funds.

PLANS TO INCREASE PRODUCTION. This condition long realized by manufacturing concerns backed by sufficient capital to enable them to produce ammunition in addition to their regular commodity, has led to considerable inquiry regarding the making of shrapnel.
