

GERMANS REPORT VICTORY ALL ALONG BANKS OF YSER

BERLIN, Nov. 12.—The Allies have been driven across the Yser at every point, says an official announcement issued by the War Office today. The Yser is now clear of the enemy all the way to the North Sea. Our attacks south of Dixmude are progressing. We have captured 700 more French soldiers there and eight cannon. The counter attacks of the enemy east of Ypres have all been repulsed.

ALLIES GAIN IN AISNE BATTLE; MENACE GERMAN RIGHT WING

PARIS, Nov. 12.—Following a long series of bloody frontal attacks, which stand without precedent for ferocity, the Allies are now trying to launch a flanking movement in the battle of Flanders. Under the protection of guns of the Anglo-French fleet, which lies off the Belgian coast, an army made up of British, French, Belgians and Indians is trying to swing around the right wing of the German forces on the Ostend-Dixmude-Ypres line.

FEARFUL LOSSES AT DIXMUDE; THEY CAME ON IN TORRENTS

Belgium, the Germans are said to have charged as many as 15 times in one night. "They came on in torrents," says a press dispatch from behind the front. Especially in the fighting at Dixmude the German officers hurled huge bodies of men into the fray regardless of the cost of the victory which they sought. The invaders won and took Dixmude, but at what a terrible cost. Probably 10,000 German soldiers fell in the assaults upon the Allies' lines at Dixmude. The town was finally taken by storm at night. The men on both sides died of heat and cold. Blast of death from machine guns swept the ranks, rifle volleys devastated the array-clad lines as they swept forward, the thunder of artillery turned the night into hideousness.

"There has also been some progress made by our forces near Berry-Au-Bac. In the Argonne region, in the Woivre, in Lorraine and in the Vosges the respective positions have undergone no change."

RUSSIANS SWEEP TURKS FROM BASE IN ARMENIAN RAID

PETROGRAD, Nov. 12.—Russian troops are continuing their successful campaign against the Turks in Armenia, it was officially announced today. Every attempt of the Turks to outflank the Czar's troops has been defeated. Many prisoners have been taken by the Russians.

PRZEMYSL STORMED AS AUSTRIANS QUIT DEFENSE OF GALICIA

The Austrian forces have begun an evacuation of central Galicia in order to provide reinforcements for the defense of Cracow. Repulse of the Russians is reported in the Stryj Valley.

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SINKING OF NIGER ADDS TO RESPECT FOR 'GERMAN RAT'

Britain Again Stirred by Bold Raid of Waters by Kaiser's Submarine—Crew of Warship Saved.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—The German submarine menace again held the attention of the Admiralty today. Selecting a new zone of operation and creeping to within a mile of the coast off Deal, only eight miles from Dover and 65 miles from London, a German submarine torpedoed and sent to the bottom the British gunboat Niger.

The Niger was in full view of hundreds on shore when a dense column of smoke was suddenly seen to rise from her. She gave a heavy list and within a short time her crew was in the water, clinging to her shattered woodwork and bits of furniture. The loud explosion brought the people of Deal rushing to the pier. The rescue of the crew by galleys which hurried out could be seen from shore.

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JAAPANESE TROOPS REPORTED MOVING TO POLAND FRONT

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—A Daily News correspondent who has just arrived in London from Port Arthur cables: "I obtained corroboration from two persons of an account given me of the passage of a quantity of Japanese heavy artillery in charge of Japanese officers over the Trans-Siberian Railway to Poland. Considerable secrecy was observed. At least two, and possibly more, long trains of Japanese guns have gone to that front."
