

DRAMA 'WHITE LIST' ANNOUNCES PLAYS CATHOLICS FAVOR

Selections of Theatre Movement Supported by Archbishop Include Varied Stage Themes.

Indorsed by Archbishop Prendergast, the Philadelphia Centre of the Catholic Theatre Movement announces today its 'white list' of plays.

The announcement is made in the official bulletin of the movement, conspicuous on the title page of which is a letter from the Archbishop calling attention to the importance of the work, and urging the Catholic societies of Philadelphia to lend their co-operation.

The purpose of the compiling of the 'white list' which has been under way, with the direction of leading Catholic clergy of Philadelphia for some time, is to advance the cause of clean theatrical entertainment and to provide for the Catholic laity a list of shows to which they may go with assurance that they will find entertainment worth while and at the same time not offensive to the strictest of the leaders of the Roman Catholic Church.

Archbishop Prendergast suggests, in his letter, the publication of the list by the Philadelphia centre will 'give strength and influence in our city for the purification and uplift of the theatrical stage.'

DR. ANNA H. SHAW'S RE-ELECTION SURE, HER ADHERENTS SAY

Test of Strength Between Suffrage Factions Arises Over Policy of Blacklisting Congressmen.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 13.—A test of strength between Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, candidate for re-election as president of the Woman's Suffrage Association, and the anti-Shaw forces will occur today when the convention votes on whether to continue the policy of blacklisting members of Congress who are on record as opposing suffrage.

The Shaw contingent predicted that the blacklisting fight would cement the president's forces and insure her re-election. It was also predicted that the blacklisting policy would be indorsed by a big majority and the association definitely committed to active opposition to all national legislators who fail to indorse suffrage.

The recent blacklisting of Congressman James Mann, of Chicago, was the subject which started the debate on the blacklisting question.

The case of Congressman Mann is a striking example of the value of the blacklist. Mrs. Medill McCormick announced from the floor, 'Congressman Mann has always been a strong anti-suffrage. He insulted women on the floor of Congress at the time of the Washington parade. He has always stood for reactionary measures. After the blacklist was published with his name in it he declared himself for women suffrage.'

Mrs. Grace Wilbur Trout, who brought about Congressman Mann's conversion to suffrage as well as being chiefly instrumental in having the Illinois suffrage law passed, started a real debate by declaring: 'Congressman Mann wrote to me that hereafter he would not oppose suffrage only after he was informed that the Illinois association had definitely refused to indorse the black list. The policy of the black list will never put men into the gentle frame of mind necessary to obtain their votes for suffrage. You can't get anything from a man when he is angry.'

CONTROVERSY WAKES WAR.

The controversy grew hot and furious, and Miss Jane Addams was forced to rap for order when the Massachusetts anti-Shaw faction declared the black list inadvisable.

The administration slate, headed by Doctor Shaw for the presidency, was announced today. The Shaw forces have stolen much strength from the insurgents by naming Mrs. Desha Breckenridge, of Lexington, Ky., the anti-Shaw candidate for president, on their own ticket. Mrs. Trout, who was slated for vice president by the anti-Shaw forces, announced this morning she would accept no office.

The Shaw slate follows: President, Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, New York; first vice president, Mrs. Katherine Dexter McCormick, New York; second vice president, Mrs. Desha Breckenridge, Kentucky; third vice president, Mrs. Medill McCormick, Illinois; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Orten B. Clark, Michigan; recording secretary, Mrs. Susan W. Fitzgerald, New York; treasurer, Mrs. Henry Wade Rogers, Connecticut.

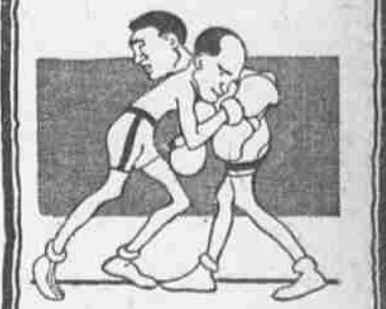
