STARVING MEN GET COURAGE WHEN THEY EAT AND GET WARM

Thousands Return to Homes, Mothers and Children From Philadelphia's Breakfast Association.

In the gray and misty dawn of any Sunday morning or late on any Sunday afternoon there may be seen on North 12th street, near Vine, one of the saddest scenes that can be found in this great city. At these times hundreds of homeless, hungry men, and sometimes a few women, assemble in line outside the Sunday Breakfast Association headquarters, and there wait, with hanging heads, until the doors of the retreat are opened. Then they file inside, where the odor of boiling coffee meets them and their red and unhappy eyes begin to aparkle slightly as they see stacks of rolls and sandwiches

waiting to give them a little strength. For more than 36 years this institution has been a haven for the unfortunates, who, through drink or wild lives, have lost their manhood and womanhood, their money and, in many cases, their self-respect and friends. After they are inside each of them is given three steaming cups of coffee and four sandwiches, and the rapidity with which they devour their portions in most cases would indicate that they have been without food for days.

But they do not only receive food to elieve their hunger and neat to soothe their benumbed and aching arms and legs. They are also given the "bread of life" for their souls' welfare. After they are all inside, usually almost 800 of them, the doors are closed and none of them is permitted to return to the streets until after religious services are ended. Personal appeals are made to them, and by this and the testimonial talks given The offering will be donated to the work by men now prosperous in the business of the Samaritan Hospital. "No person can guess the results of the work, which is entirely undenomina-tional." declared W. Bruce Barrow, treasurer of the organization, a few days ago. "Time and again we are surprised to have well-dressed Christian men, some of them with good businesses in this city and in all parts of the world, come back to the old church and get up and tell the boys that where they are the visitors were once also, and letters are received often giving exactly the same kind of stories of the men who were once afraid and ashamed, but who decided to start out again at the Sunday Breakfast Associa-

Sometimes mothers find their sons, whom they mourned as dead, standing in the line. Sometimes alsters and wives gase into the faces of the shivering and ranged audience and their eyes meet those of their brothers and husbands, and they are reunited. Every Sunday there is some such tragedy witnessed, and great is the such tragedy witnessed, and great is the joy of those who are doing the work when they see just one more mother made happy as her "boy" walks ' and home by her side, or when a father smiles the old love smile are again and klasses his one-time sweetheart and returns to comfort his starving children and to try to provide for his home once more. o provide for his home once more. The Sunday Breakfast Association is the oldest organization of its kind, and its work is the most extensive in the country. It was started at lith and Wood streets, but since 1855 it has been in the old church on 12th street, which was once the place of worship of the Eleventh Baptist Church.

It depends entirely on private contribu-tions for support, and up to the present time it has always had sufficient funds for its work. The most prominent men in Philadelphia are helping the work, and some of those who were encouraged to start out on the "new path" to the "right way" when they went there for a sandwich and cup of coffee to keep from stary-

Pastors and elders should give prayerful consideration to the matter of systematic oversight and visitation of the entire membership of their respective congregations so as to revent the "larsing" of members, and thus reduce to a minimum the number to be placed on the auspended roll.

Members who remove to new neighborhoods at a considerable distance from their church, and who find is difficult to attend the services, should be encouraged by the session to unite with a church near at hand.
