BILLY LEDGER'S GOSSIP

Young William O. Rowland, of the Recoust Club, better known as "Billy" Rowland, has the proverbial nine-lived feline beaten to a frazzle. His many friends refer to him as the Accident King. He appears to bear a charmed life, judging from the series of surprising raishans he has experienced.

The latest was on Friday night returning from the Wansmaker dance.
