GERMANS TORPEDO BIG CUNARD LINER OFF BRITISH COAST

The Malachite Sunk by Submarine After Crew Had Been Ordered Into Boats.

LONDON, Nov. 25-That the activity of German submarines in the North Sea and English Channel continues unabated in shown by the blowing up of the British steamship Malachite while bound from Liverpool to Havre.

The Malachite, which was owned by the Cunard Line, was stopped three miles west of Cape Lavel by a German submarine and her crew was allowed 10 minutes to get into the ship's small boats. When this was done the sub-marine fired a torpedo, which sank the English merchanimen. Then the sub-marine disappeared, leaving the Main-chite's sufficient to the sub-




