So much interest has been taken in the work by the matron and Mr. Hill that all the children call the latter "Mister George." By adopting the unique methods the leaders keep the children enthused, and they are always anxious for the meetings and special entertainments. So successful have the methods been that they would serve as excellent examples for

societies everywhere to copy.

Not only are the youngsters kept interested in the meetings, which are always presided over by the president of the society, who wields a gavel with great force, but there are field days arranged each year, and the boys and girls vie with each other for inexpensive prizes. For instance, there are cook races, basketball games, baby carriage races, and all kind of novel entertainment in the open on the spacious lawn surround-

Anniversary days are "big" days, and there are always plenty of entertainment of unusual kinds. Last year, when the annual entertainment was given, several hundred persons were unable to gain ad-mittance to the hall. "Mister George" usually prepares some special exercises that are not only interesting and entertaining, but attractive as well, as colored ribbons, streamers and electric lights are used to brighten the sight for the children and visitors.

The last subject of their anniversary entertainment was "The Captive." A young girl, the Captive, was bound in fetters by the Spirit of Darkness. Then the story tells how joy and hope came to her. Heralds appeared and told their tales. The Spirit of Love, accompanied by some statement of the st by cross-and-crown bearers, came and vanquished the Spirit of Darkness, and at last the Captive was freed at the foot of a beautiful cross

Five girls presented the 'Rock of Ages' in pantomine. Colored lights were thrown upon them as they changed their pos-tures, and the rays of the illuminated cross also fell on the Cantive whose dark dress is changed to immaculate white.


