#### **DEPOSITS INCREASE IN WEEK**

Advance of \$617,567 Made by Local Reserve Bank.

The weekly report of the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia up to the close of business last night, which is the second Issued since the institution was placed in operation, November 16, shows an increase of \$617,567 in deposits over the previous week and a falling off of \$51,237 in cash holdings. The loans and discounts of the bank, which were all made during the last week, totaled \$880,000. Up to last night the bank had issued \$430,000 in new Federal reserve notes. All of these were ssued during the week.
