The University of Pennsylvania fotball team needs a man with a personality that can command the respect of the players and insill them with the spirit that wins games, according to prominent members of the alumni who say that there has been no such man connected with the football team since "Mike" Murphy.

There is a general opinion among the alumni, the student body and the members of the team at the University that something must be done to improve the showing that has been made by the football team. Although there is considerable talk about proposed changes. nothing definite has been done, and owing to the delicacy of the situation nobobdy is willing to be quoted until after official action has been taken.

"We do really need a man with a permonality like 'Mike' Murphy," said a former football star. "Murphy could put more fight into a team and got more out of the players than any other man I know of. He turned the tide of more foot-ball games than anybody ever realized. "I do not believe that the team had any such personality behind it this year. The with of the varies behavior believes. The vote of the varsity players shows con-clusively that something was radically wrong.

"Nobody, in my opinion, can say that George Brooke did not do all that was in his power to produce a winning team. But it is evident that either the system

was at fault or the players were not properly drilled. "George Brooke would make an excel-lent advisory coach, but the football men need somebody with a striking person-slity and different teaching methods on the field. the field.

Athletics' Second Sacker Played in 152 Games, While Georgian Only Participated in 97-One Dozen Batsmen in American League Hit Above .300 Mark.

Although "Ty" Cobb is again the leading batsman of the American League for the season of 1914, "Eddle" Collins topped the Georgian in every department of the games except the average column. The figures show that Cobb only played in 97 games, while Connie Mack's leading player was in 152 games. The only games in which Collins did not participate were three just before the world's series, when the yani-gams were doing duty for the Mackmen, while they rested for their unfortunate ulit with the Braves, and one game in Boston when he had his ankle injured. Cobb's average for the season was, 358, while Collins slugged at a .344 clip. In runs earned, two-base hits, three-base hits and total bases, Collins headed Cobb. "Eddle" was also the leading base stealer of the league with 55 to his credit.


