FOES GRIPPED IN DESPERATE CONFLICT FOR CRACOW GOAL

Austrians Check Russian Advance in Hot Engagement in West Galicia, Taking 10,000 Prisoners and Many Guns-Also Win in the Carpathians.

Defeat in Galicia and German Victories at Lodz, Lowicz and Przasnysz Will Force Withdrawal of Invading Armies to Withstand Kaiser's Sweep on to Petrograd, Is Belief in Vienna.

The Russian investment of Cracow is about to be abandoned, according to advices from Vienna. The Austrian army has won decided successes in Western Galicia, holding the progress of the advancing Russian col-

In the West Galician battle in defense of Cracow, the Austrians already have captured 10,000 prisoners and numerous guns, while farther east they have blocked the Russian movement across the Carpathians.

German capture of Lodz, southwest of Warsaw, and Przasnysz, north of Warsaw, have not only imperiled the Polish capital, but have placed the Russians in a defensive position in order to withstand a complete sweep of Russia to Petrograd by the victorious Germans. Vienna expects the immediate diversion of the Czar's armies invading Galicia to strengthen the Poland battle line.

Petrograd admits the seriousness of the situation in Galicia, where the Austro-Germans are described as making a supreme effort to break the Russian advance. Fighting south of Cracow is developing into one of the great battles of the war, under direction of the German Staff, which has

The enemy showed some activity in the region of Ypres yesterday. He directed several attacks against our lines, three of which were completely repulsed. At only one point of the front did the Germans succeed in reaching one of our trenches in the first line.

For our part, we have continued to advance in the direction of the enemy's lines in the region of Arras and in that of Juvincourt.

In the Argonne we have pushed forward several of our trenches and rolled back two German attacks.

In the face of the great numerical superiority of the Austrians, the Servians were compelled to fall backwart for nearly a month, in order to retire to a position where they could give battle under favorable cenditions.

Finally the Serviens made a stand upon the slopes of Mount Ruduik, where a battle began on December 3 and lasted five days. The fight, which raged over a front about 69 miles long, resulted in a complete rout for the Austrians. True, our losses were heavy, but those of the enemy were enormous.



THAW'S LEGAL FIGHT FOR LIBERTY WAGED IN SUPREME COURT

Question of Slayer's Extradition as Criminal Argued Before Highest Tribunal.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 .- Attorneys for Harry K. Thaw and the State of New York today waged in the United States Supreme Court the final battle over the extradition of the slayer of Stanford White from New Hampshire to New York to stand trial for conspiracy in his escape from the Matteawan Insane Asylum.

He declared the Federal courts had no right to enter into the motives of a State n extradition proceedings and expected the Supreme Court to reverse Judge Aldrich's ruling. MR. KNOX'S ARGUMENT.

Mr. Knox asserted the extradition pa pers on their face were invalid because that Thaw was a fugitive from the custodial power of a State, a thing that could not serve as the basis of extradition. Ex-Governor Stone Evgued that, as far as the courts of New York were con-cerned, Thaw legally had been declared insane, hence he cannot be extradited.

GERMAN ARMORED CRUISER SUNK BY MINE IN BATTLE

Most of Crew Lost in Disaster That Occurred in November.

PARIS, Dec. IL

The German armored cruiser Friedrich Karl is reported to have been sunk in the Baltic Sea by a mine and most of her crew drowned, according to an official statement issued at the French Minlatry of Marine today. The Friedrich Karl carried 557 officers and men.

The sinking of the Friedrich Karl is said to have occurred late in November. Prins Adalbert and was built in 1801. SAYS P. R. R. HAS RATE DELUSION

Comment When Commuters Show Company Increased Stock, Added to Surplus and Paid 6 Per Cent. Dividend.

Attempt Made in Cross-examination to Prove Railroad Conspiracy in Simultaneous Fare Increases.

FACTS BROUGHT OUT AT RAILROAD HEARING

The capital stock of the Pennsylvania Railroad has increased from \$149,000,000 to \$500,000,000 since 1911.

The company has a surplus fund of \$25,000,000, into which \$5,000,000 was paid between 1911 and 1914.

The company maintains subsidiary companies whose dividends are a precarious source of income. Prominent among these is the Susquellanna Coal Company.

Notwithstanding these conditions the company is able to pay 6 per cent.
annual dividends.

Approximately \$2,000,000 is the estimated return from the proposed passenger increase.

The proposed 5 per cent. freight increase is expected to yield \$5,000,000.

Comment of Acting Chairman Pennypacker; "We seem to be dealing with a delusion. This making up by commutation increases does not seem a wise suggestion." wise suggestion."

Evidence so favorable to the contention that the railroads are not justified in their proposed increases in fares as to draw from Samuel W. Pennypacker significant comments supporting the commuters' side, and charges of collusion and conspiracy against the Pennsylvania, the Reading and the Baltimore and Ohio Railroads in proposing simultaneous passenger rate increases, provided sensutions at the Pennsylvania Public Service Commission's hearing this afternoon.

De Long, assistant general passenger agent for the same company, made during the cross-examination, it was shown that the Pennsylvania, since 1911, had increased its capital stock from \$149,000,000 to \$500 -600,000; had paid \$5,000,000 into a surplus fund; had supported subsidiary companies paying uncertain dividends, and at the same time had been able to pay a regular annual 6 per cent, dividend to its atockholders on the increased stock.

That any increase in passenger teriffs should be sought in face of these figures. was bitterly opposed by Ward W. Pier-aon and Harold S. Sherts, who were con-ducting the cross-examination. Frequent ducting the cross-examination. Frequent interruption by Mr. Pennypacker indicated that he, too, was not convinced of the necessity for the sweeping raises planned by the Pennsylvania, Reading and the Baltimore and Ohio Railroads.

TRY TO SHOW CONSPIRACE. J. F. Fell, Jr., and Edward S. Osterhaus, chief rate clerk for the Reading passenger department, were cross-examined by Attorneys Pierson and Sherts in their effort to bring out an admission of collusion and conspiracy in violation of the Sherman anti-trust act.

Both officials admitted that various meetings were held both here and in New York between the rate officials of all three companies, but neither would admit that the rate increases of each road were submitted to the other roads before they were filed. The morning hearing adjourned at 1
