It was organized on December 7, 1911, and although it had but five members at that time, there are now more than 200 active workers on its roll.

The monthly dues of the society are 50 The monthly dues of the society are 50 cents. This entitles to sick and death benefits. At the end of the fiscal year the society dissolves and a refund is made to the members. In 1912 the refund was 45.24 per capita. In 1933 it only totaled \$4.05. This year's return amounted to \$5.81. Five cents of the monthly membership dues is set aside for a permanent fund. In case any member in good standing shall be sick or disabled at the time of the annual dissolution who had not rethe annual dissolution who had not re-ceived any benefits during the year, he shall be entitled to the sum of 25, or five weeks' benefits from the permanent

The pastor of the church, the Rev. Robert Burns Wallace, and the officials of the society are so enthusiastic at the good results of the association that they have decided to organize for social service work, so as to be in a position to relieve much of the prevalent distress in the northeast section of the city.

There are no paid officers, save the secretary, who receives only a nominal

At the last meeting arrangements were made for a banquet, to be held early in February, at which the social service features contemplated will be discussed.
