MERION EMERGENCY AID

in at yesterday's meeting by the prominent Merion woman belonging to the new branch, and these included four dozen pillowcases, 12 wrappers, 21 pairs of pajamas and 25 convalescent jackets. About as many other articles are in a "nearly finished" state, so it looks as if the next meeting, planned for shortly after Christmas, would bring together several hundred pieces. After each meeting the finished garments are sent to the Emergency Aid Headquarters, and this means that the pleass turned in yesterday will be well on their errand of mercy before the next tot is finished.

It is the intention of the mambers to send the supplies in as fast as the finished garments can be made. Three or four sowing machines are kept busy at each meeting, while at the same time buttons are sewed on and buttonholes made as quickly as interested fingers can ply the meedle.
