Big Slaughter of Vermin. Rats of all nations find it hard to in vade Philadelphia as a result of the precautions taken by Director Harte, of the Health Department. Since the bureau of rat inspection was established, 5488 live rats and 807 dead ones have been received at its headquarters. During November 863 buildings were inspected.

As soon as a vessel reaches Marcus Hook a report of sanitary conditions is telegraphed to the department, and if any rate are aboard they are immediately captured to prevent the carrying of germs into the city. During November 45 vessels from foreign ports were inspected, making a total of 267 inspected since the rat crusade was started.




