HARVARD STUDENTS SHOW INCREASED INTEREST IN SPORTS

Record Number Participated This Year in Athletics. 1324 Men Engaged in All Branches.

A new record in the number of students participating in athletics was set up at Harvard this year, when 1324 students, according to the statistics given out at Cambridge, took part in some form of athletics. The 1914 figures show an increase of 187 participants over last year's figures. In the freshman class, approximately 8 per cent of the entire enrollment went in for athletics.

Track and lacrosse were the only two sports which showed a decline. Baseball and fencing drew about the same number of men as they did a year ago, and all the other sports practicing at Cambridge showed an amazing gain.

The sport calling out the greatest number of men was football, with 246 names enrolled. This tremendous increase over last year's mark of 213 was due to the intercollegiate and Houghton cup series. Rowing also showed a large gain in numbers, figures in this sport showing an increase of 68. Track had 178 men out, hockey 151, and there were 147 men in the tennis tournaments and interclass matches. The detailed statistics follow:
