MEN AND WOMEN OF THE SUNDAY PARTY ARE REAL WORKERS

Some Have Had Years of Experience and All Have Definite Work That Contributes Much to Success.

Although the regular party of workers that accompany the Ray, Dr. William A. Bunday on his campaign trips to all parts of the country is large and every member is busy from the time a campaign opens until it closes, it has been decided to add new workers to the party for the Philadelphia campaign because of the extensive revival to be conducted here. Aumouncement of the additional workers will be made in the early future.

The organization plans are so well laid by Mr. Sunday that each leader has some specific duty to perform, and what he or she does dovetails into the work of the other leaders of the party. Besides Mr. Sunday there were ten active workers who were leaders in one kind of work or another in the recent campaigns of the evangelist.

One of the hardest workers for the advancement of the revivals wherever Mr. Sunday goes, is Mrs. Sunday. She has exceptional executive ability, and assists greatly in the women's work. She attends many of the drawing room gather-

tends many of the drawing room gatherings of women, and takes charge of some
of the larger meetings for women while
her husband is busy with the men.
The Rev. E. H. Emett, who has been
here for some weeks, is largely responsible for the organization for work previous to Mr. Sunday's arrival in the towns

Rodeheaver, the singer and composer, who leads the singing in the tabernacles and keeps everybody smiling all the while. By keeping the audiences in a good humor he contributes much to the success of the revivals conducted by Mr. Sunday.

Today there is no more active worker and devoted member of the Sunday party than Mr. Speice. Not in-frequently he speaks at the men's meet-ings in the early part of the campaigns. FINANCING CAMPAIGN COST ABOUT \$50,000

Collections Expected to Pay It Soon. Sunday Gets Last Day's Offering.

The cost of financing the Sunday cam-aign in this city will be about \$50,000. paign in this city will be about \$50,000. Of this, approximately \$15,000 was spent in the construction of the big tabernacle at 19th and Vine streets. Another \$40 was spent on the nursery, restaurant and was spent on the nursery, restaurant and rest room building across the Parkway from the Yabernacis. Office expenditures for printing, post-

Office expenditures for printing, postage, clerk hire, telephones and other preliminary work added to the cost of maintaining the office and force of workers during the meetings, will total about \$2,000\$. Included in the latter will also be the rental of the house at 19th and Spring Garden streets, in which \$4r\$, Sunday and many of his workers will live, and for another building for the remainder of the party. Pledges for the expanses will be released as soon as the sollections warrant.

The committee in charge of the campaign has made Mr. Sunday no guarantee regarding what he is to receive for his services and if they had made him an offer he would have refused to accept it. He never makes any fixed charge for any sampaign. Instead, when he finds that he is wanted, he leaves the financial side of the matter out of the discussion from the beginning and demands only that the church people co-operate to make the cannotain a sprittual success.

THOUSANDS OF LOCAL PEOPLE IN CAMPAIGN

Singers, Ushers and Committee Workers Will Have Lots of Work. When the Sunday campaign gets started there will be thousands of persons engaged in active work. Members of Mr. Sunday's party, in charge of different committees, will call the leaders together as soon as they arrive and explain what is expected of them. Then they will get busy and will never have a day's rest until the 10 weeks' campaign is ended.

Great care is taken in training the workers, and the ushers are always given two or three evenings' drilling before the work actually begins. There will be 400 phia churches of all Christian denomina-ushers engaged in taking care of the crowd each night. A call for volunteers resulted in responses from about 1200 ex-perienced men from hundreds of churches. More will be enlisted as rapidly as pos-

In addition to the army of ushers there In addition to the army of ushers there are now approximately 550 women definitely committed to the women's Invitation Committee, of which Mrs. Edwin C. Grice is chairman. Then there will be 3500 persons in the choir; on the General Committee there are about 100 men and women; there will be 150 secretaries, and since three men are being en-rolled from each church interested for work in the men's league, it is possible that there will be more than 1500 "personal worker' leaders.

Besides all these organisations there will be the hundreds of chairmen and secre-taries in charge of the district prayer meetings in homes, scores of men in charge of the shop meetings, which do so much good by bringing the men to the meetings and keeping them interested. 
