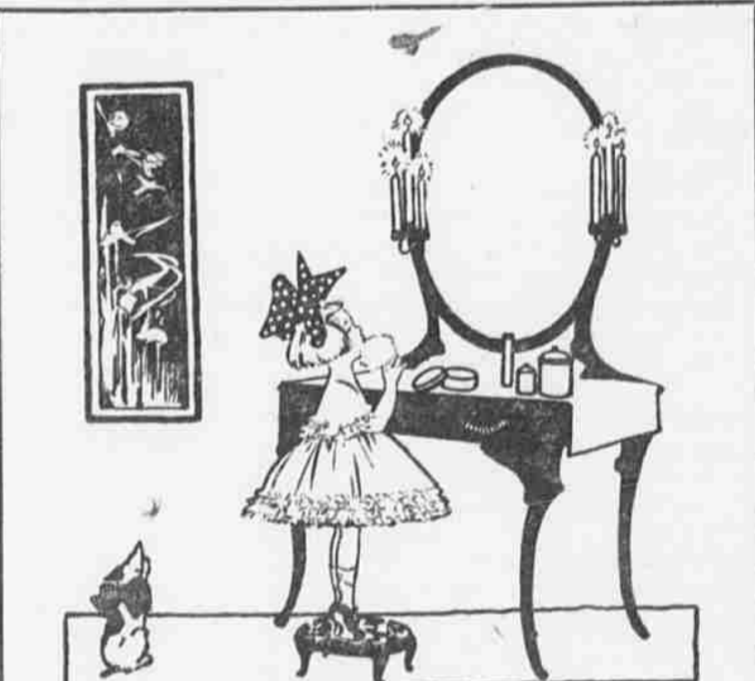

## Saturday Evening

"POWER OF THE CROSS"  
On Saturday night Mr. Sunday chose as his text I. Corinthians, 1, 18: "For the preaching of the cross is to us which are perishing, foolishness, but to us which are saved, it is the power of God."

He opened his discourse by showing that power in the one thing which men have striven after since the world began.

Mr. Sunday showed that we but a slight step between a parallel between the things seeming foolish when we are foolish. "The text comes like a word of judgment," he said. "It divides the world into two classes, the saved and the lost. What a foolishness is the unsaved in the power of the highest order because of God. If the Bible is nonsense to you, you ought to be alarmed."

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
