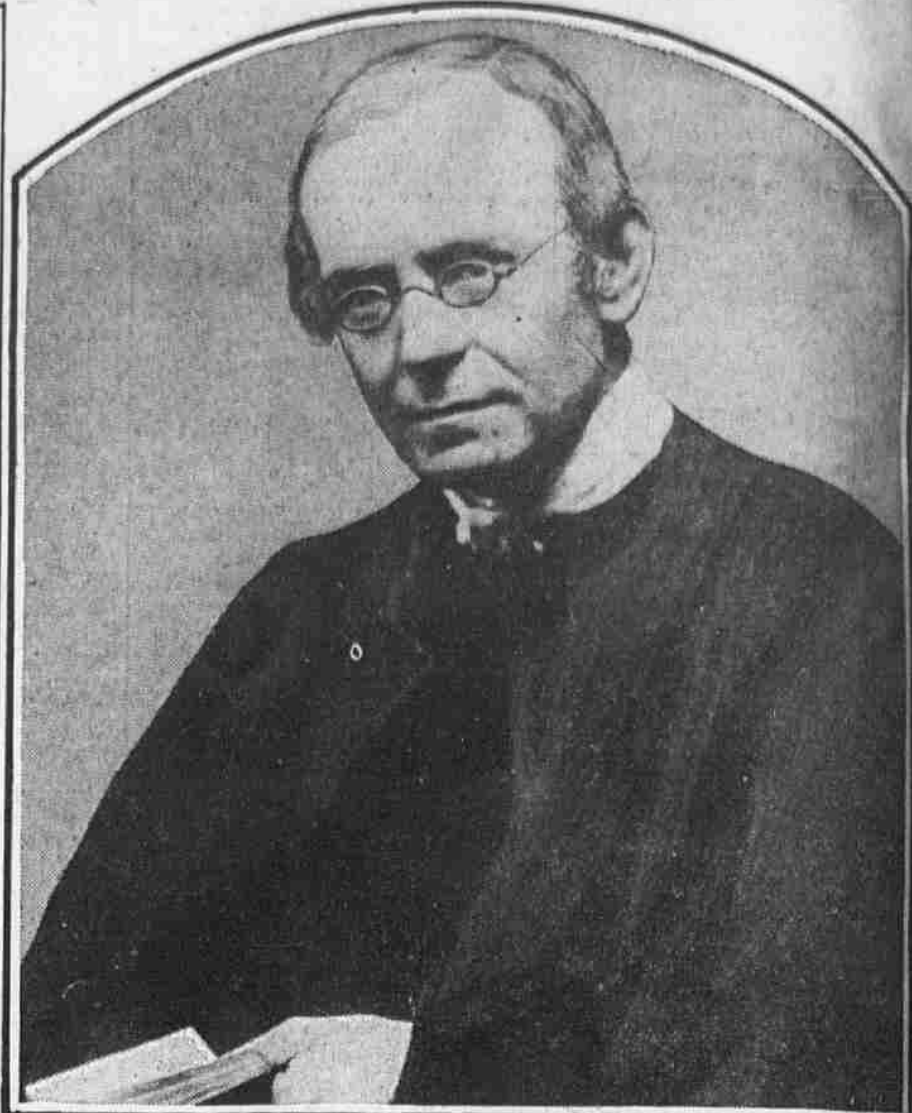

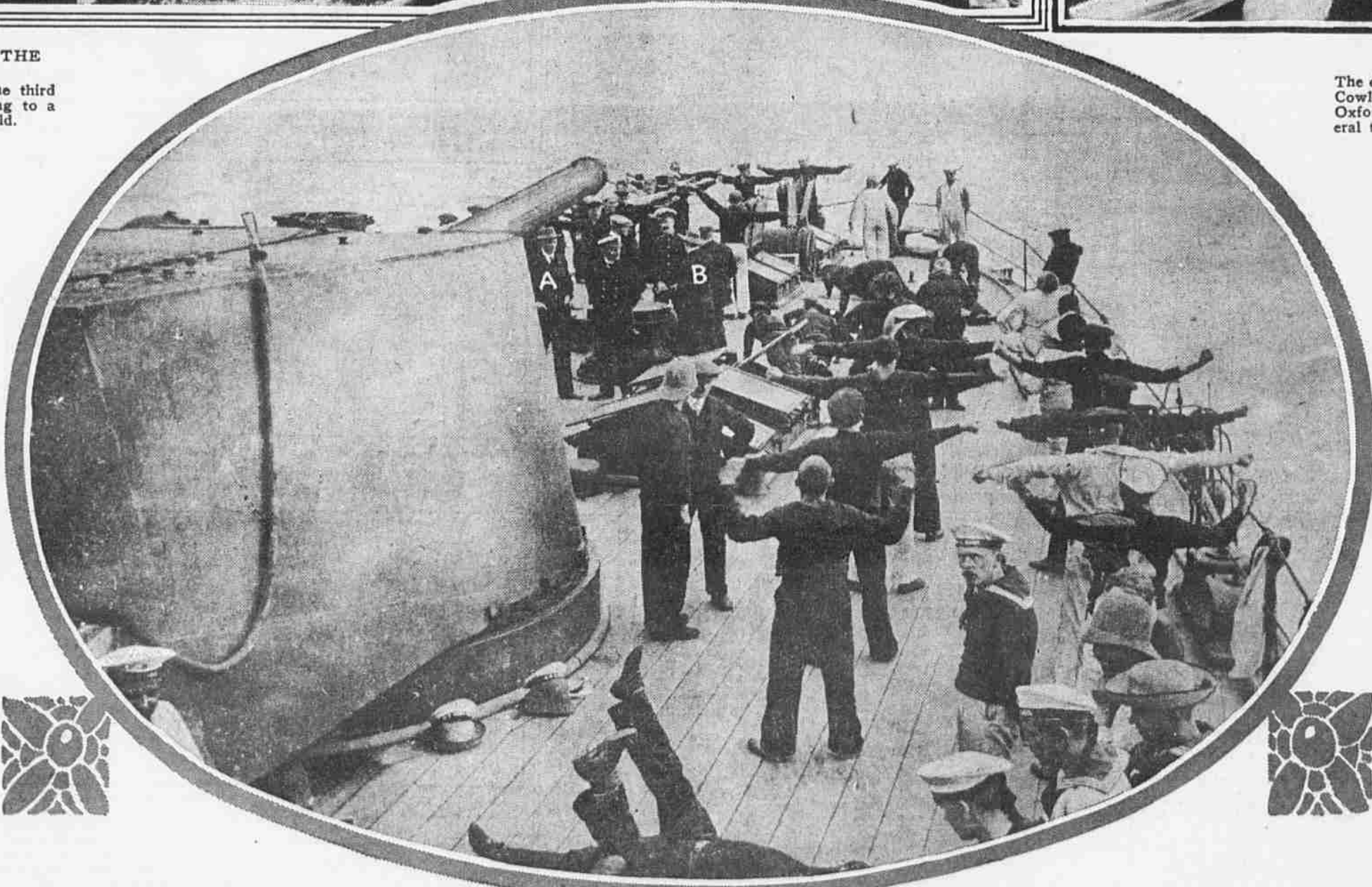


GENERAL HINDENBURG AT THE FRONT

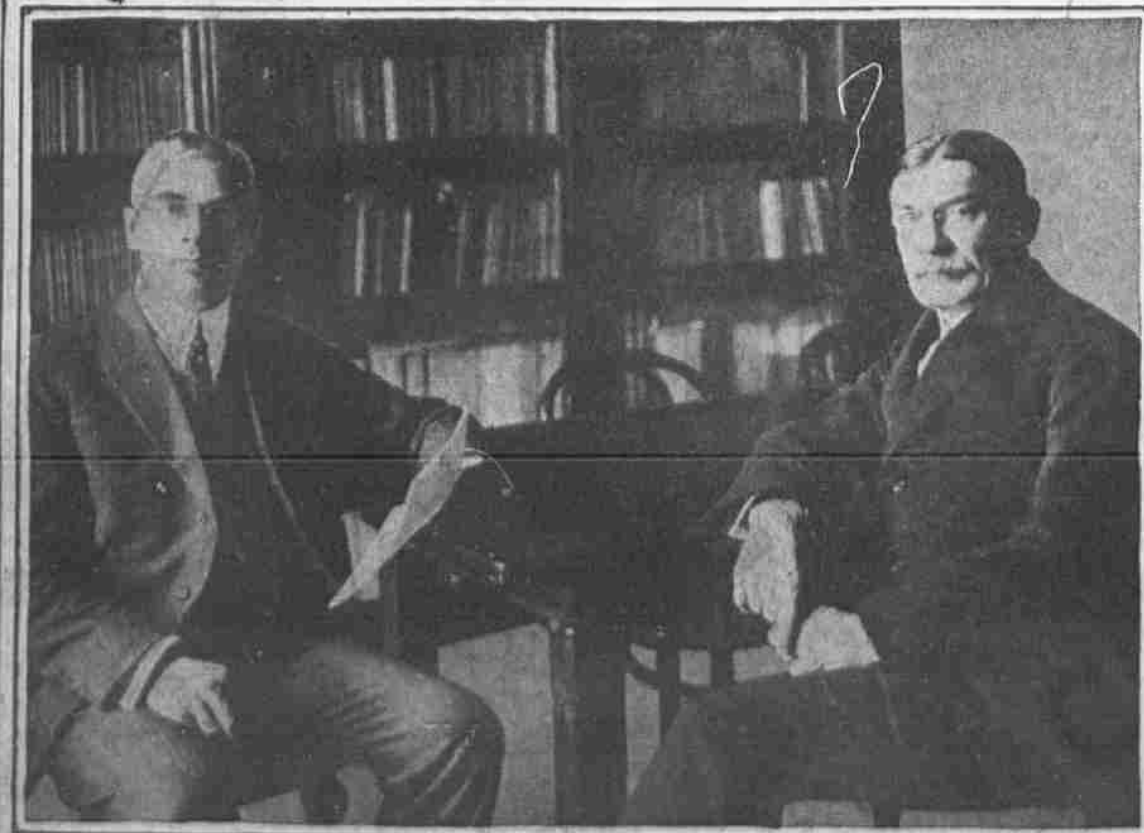
A NICE GIRL, BUT ISN'T ONE
