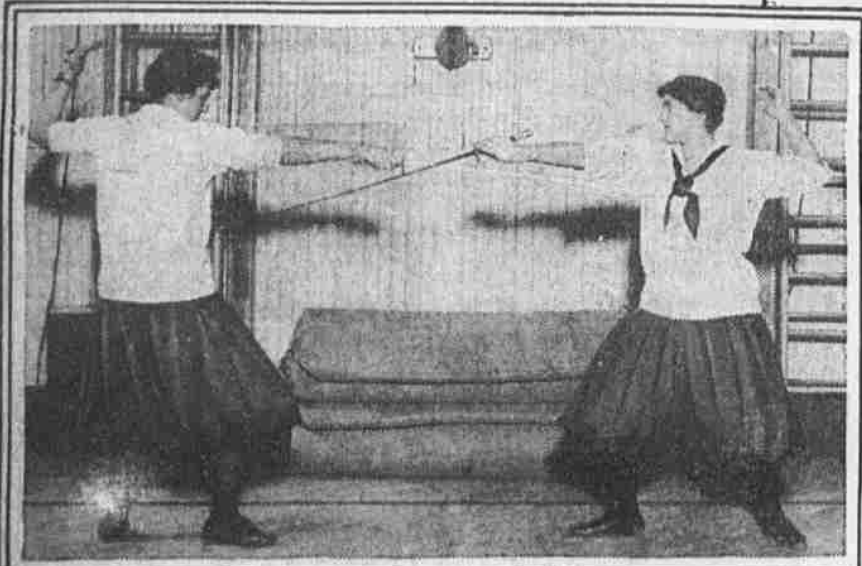
A POOR PLACE TO STAND ON ONE'S HEAD

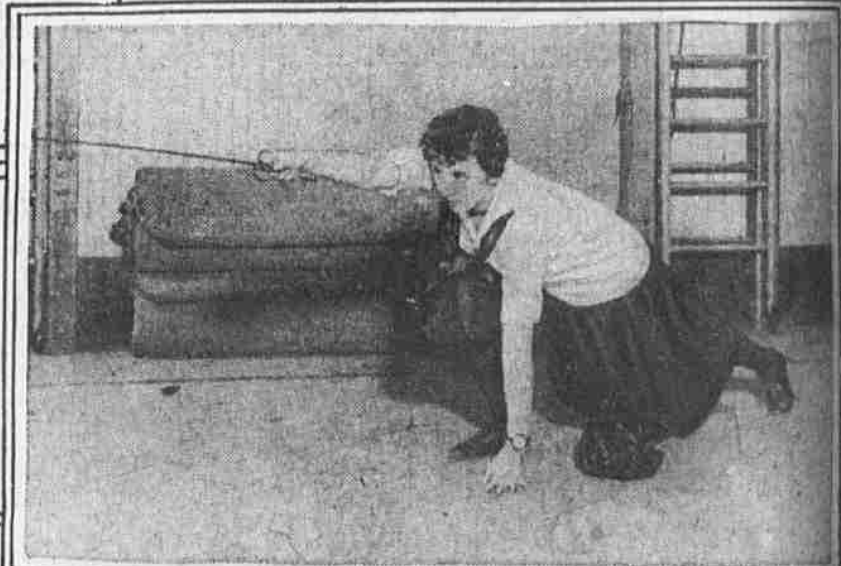
