This money shall pay a sept of \$100,000, and the additional amount ref MIS,000 the Board of Foreign Missions swill devote toward the erection of chapel, sespital and school buildings in Japan and

woos hundred and twenty-one community groups, consisting of pastors and laymen. have been appointed throughout the Valted States to solicit contributions from the 512,000 communicant members.

Advance pledges have been received at the board's headquarters, Reformed Church Building, this city, amounting to

about \$20,000. The widow of the Rev. Clement Z. Welser, D. D., who was for many years president of the Board of Foreign Misgloss and the father of the famous Peace Commission of 1878 in the Reformed Church, has made a contribution of \$5000 to the Prince of Peace fund. A member of the board and a leader in the laymen's of the board and a leader in the laying missionary movement has pledged or condition that the debt be paid. Fifty men in Philadelphia are at work in soliciting \$20,000 from the membership

No other movement has so stirred the entire denomination like this Prince Peace fund campaign.




Doctor Berkowitz Addresses Special Discourse to Youngsters.

The occasion will mark the celebration of Doctor Conwell's pirthday and the annual observance of Founders' Day of the university. In addition to the faculty and the students who will attend, many men prominent in the city's professional, business, educational and religious life will be present. Judge Elkins will preside.

Although he is about to celebrate his 72d birthday, Doctor Conwell works as hard as he did in his prime. But he wisely conserves his energies. He never wordes, and he does one thing at a time. That is why he has been so successful in the many fields of endeavor in which he has been engaged. Today Doctor Con-well stands in the front rank of the many well stands in the front rank of the many brilliant and distinguished men not only of Fhiladelphia, but in the world. In ad-dition to organizing and building the largest Baptist church in the country, the Baptist Temple, Doctor Conwell founded Temple University, an institu-tion designed to bring the benefits of a higher education within reach of the poor and which is considered by many as des-tined to revolutionize the educational system throughout the world. In addi-tion to his great church and college, Doctor Conwell has fathered two hospitala, the Samaritan and the Garretson. According to Doctor Conwell, his work along the three lines of religion, educa-tion and "healing the sick" has been prompted by the belief that Christ com-

"When Jesus was upon earth," says Doctor Conwell, "He devoted His atten-tions to three things—healing the sick, teaching the ignorant and preaching the Gospel. We have endeavored to follow Christ's ideal. Our hospitals heal the sick; Temple University gives an education to thousands of young men who otherwise would never obtain it; and in the temple we preach the Gospel. Every church in the world should endeavor to follow out Christ's ideal in these things. always adapting its work to local condi-

But his church, university and hospitals represent but a part of Doctor Conwell's work and usefulness to mankind. The proceeds of his lectures, amounting to \$8,680,000, have been devoted to helping

### MISSIONARIES IN PERSIA SAFE, REPORTS MORGENTHAU

Relief Needed for Refugees, However, Says Board.

The condition of the American missionaries and native Christians at Tabris and Urumia, Persia, is safe, according to the latest report received by the State Dapartment from Ambassador Henry Morgenthau at Constantinople. The State Department communicated with the Ambassador, requesting him to make a careful inquiry into the condition of American missionaries in Persia. The following reply was received from the Am-

In reply to your recent inquiries as to the condition of the missionaries and native Christians at Tabris and Urumia, Persia, wish to say that the American Consul at Tabris telegraphs American missionaries safe. Native Christians at Tabriz and Urumia un-molested. There are many refugees. This will bring great relief to Persians

This will bring great relief to Persians in this country, who have feared that their people in Urumia had suffered attack. If the various reports are correct, it would seem that those who fled to Urumia and Tabriz might, perhaps, have remained safely at home. It was only natural, however, that they should fear the approach of the Turks and Kurda. The problem still remains how to get relief to the refugees in Tabriz and Urumia, says the Board of Foreign Missions, the offices of which are in New York. The board is doing its beat in sending relief moneys to Persia for distribution by the American consular authorities. American consular authorities.
