Strawberries at 40 cents and 50 cents per box are finding buyers at the Twading Terminal, as well as butter at 48 cents per pound; eggs at 35 cents per dozen and roasting chickens as high as 25 cents mer normed H.C. Garbart who exist from per pound. H. C. Gerhart, who gets from 25 cents to 28 for his chickens, predicts that the fowls will be out of reach next

Rib roast at 28 cents per pound, accordg to William R. Margerum, chuck at rump and round steaks at 28, sirioin at 22, hamburger for 20 is not high. Lamb chops bring 30 cents, veal 25, while pre-pared ham is selling for 30 cents per pound, fresh sausage for 23 and scrapple for 14.

With the exception of the pork prices neat is offered considerably cheaper at the Ridge Avenue Market.
