

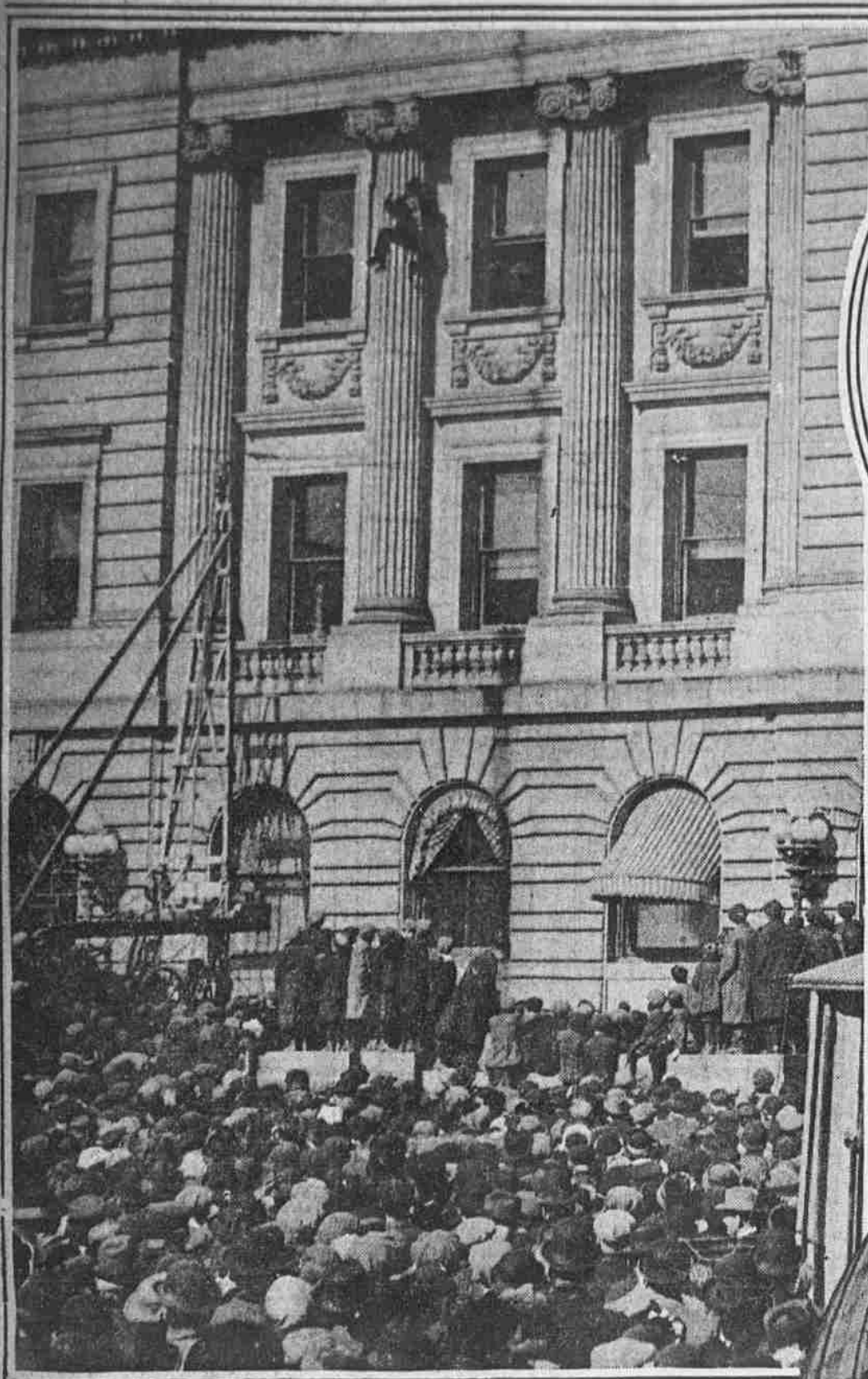

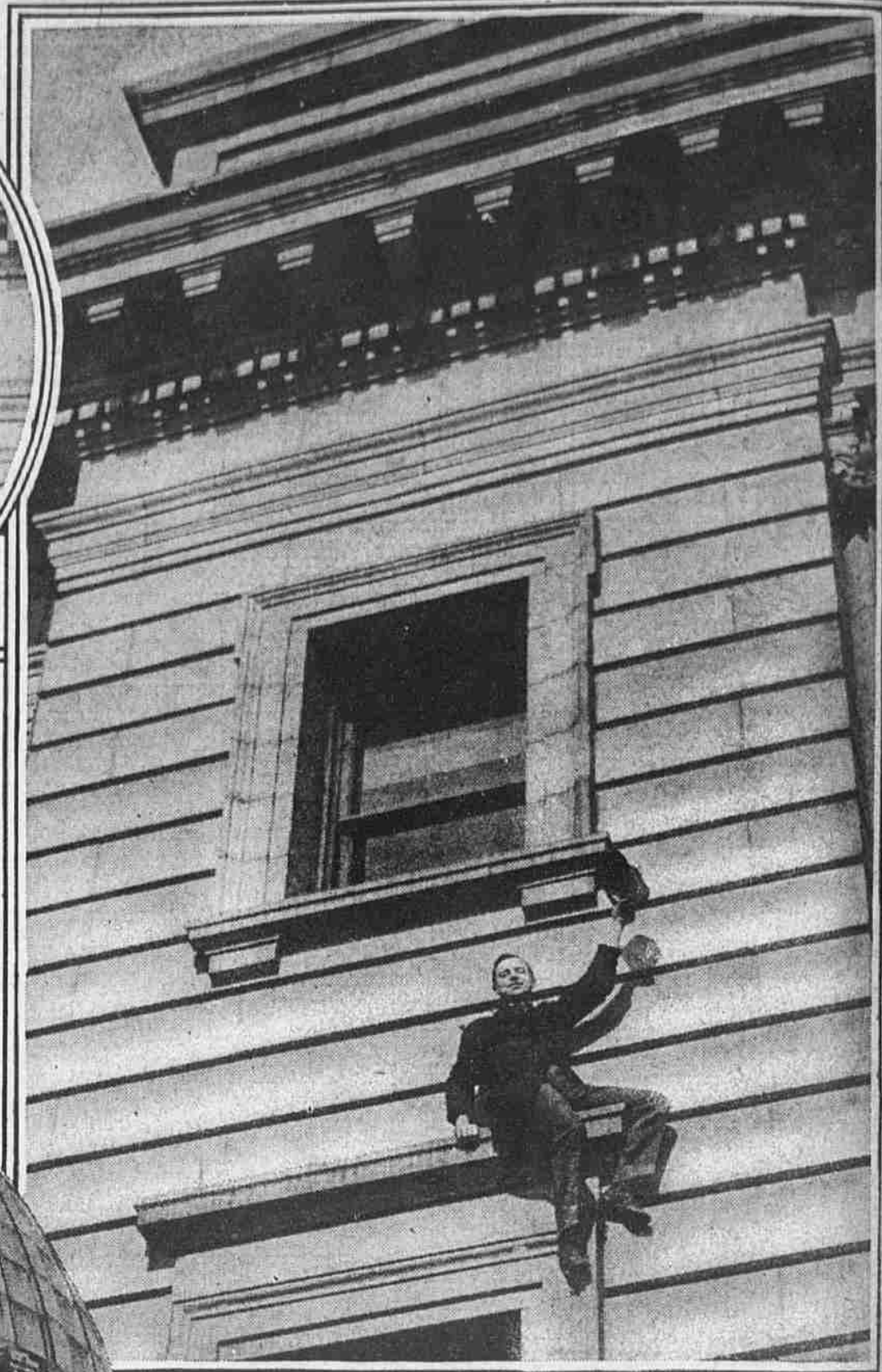
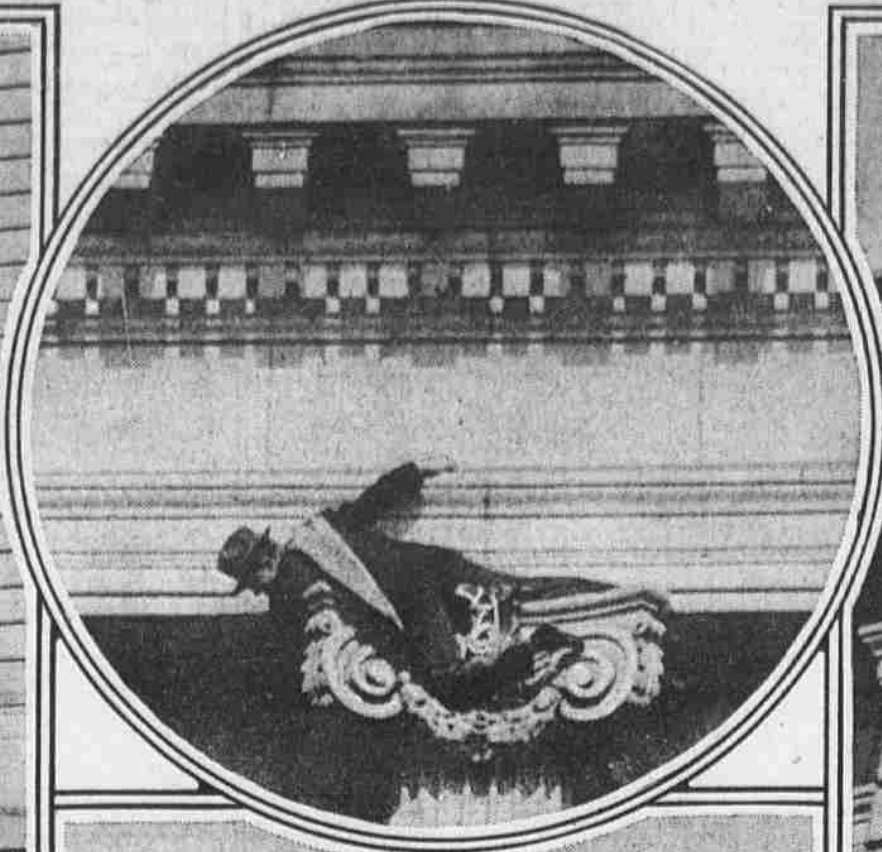

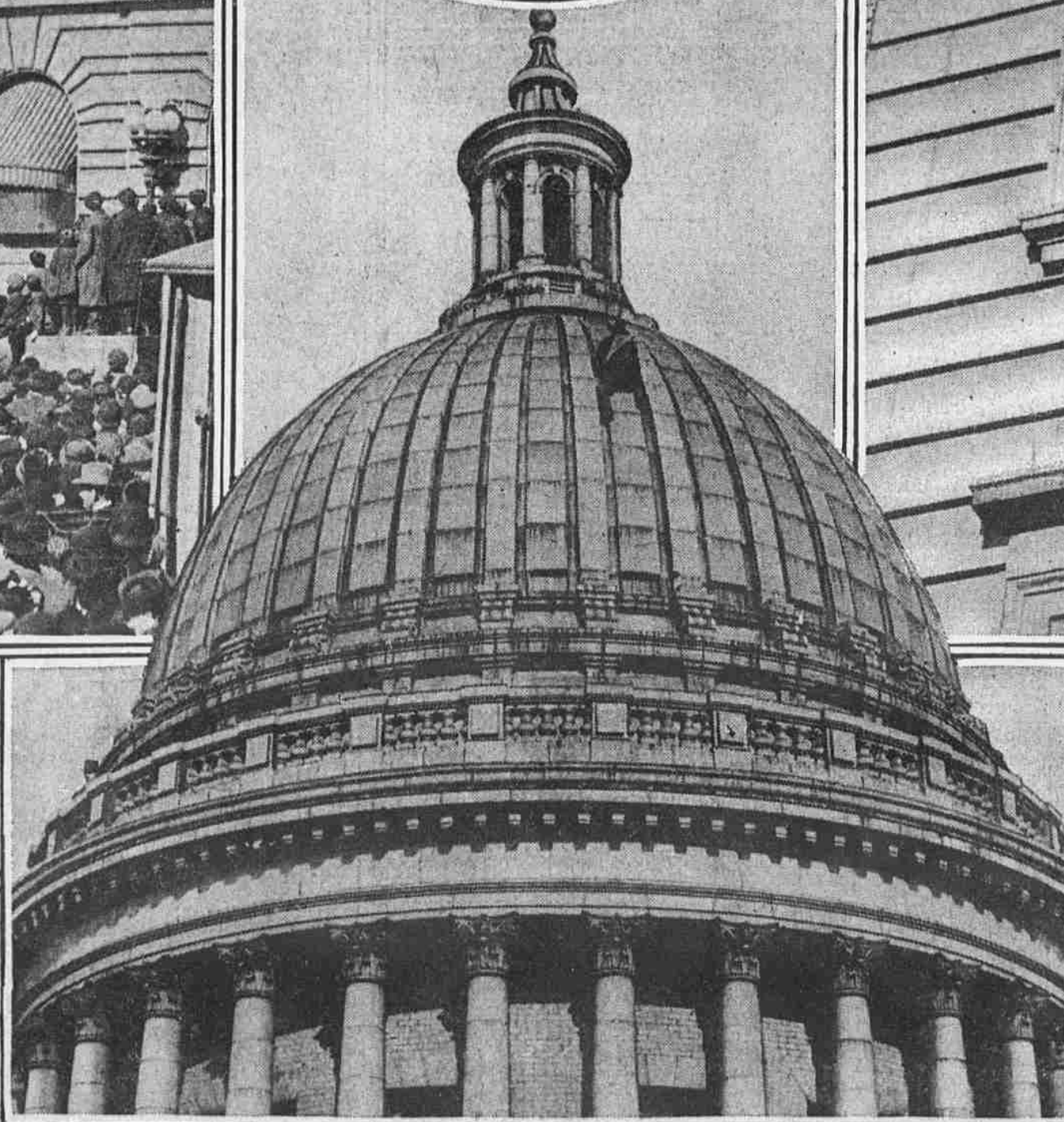
PERSONS, PLACES AND SCENES PROMINENT IN THE NEWS OF A WORLD'S DOINGS DAY BY DAY

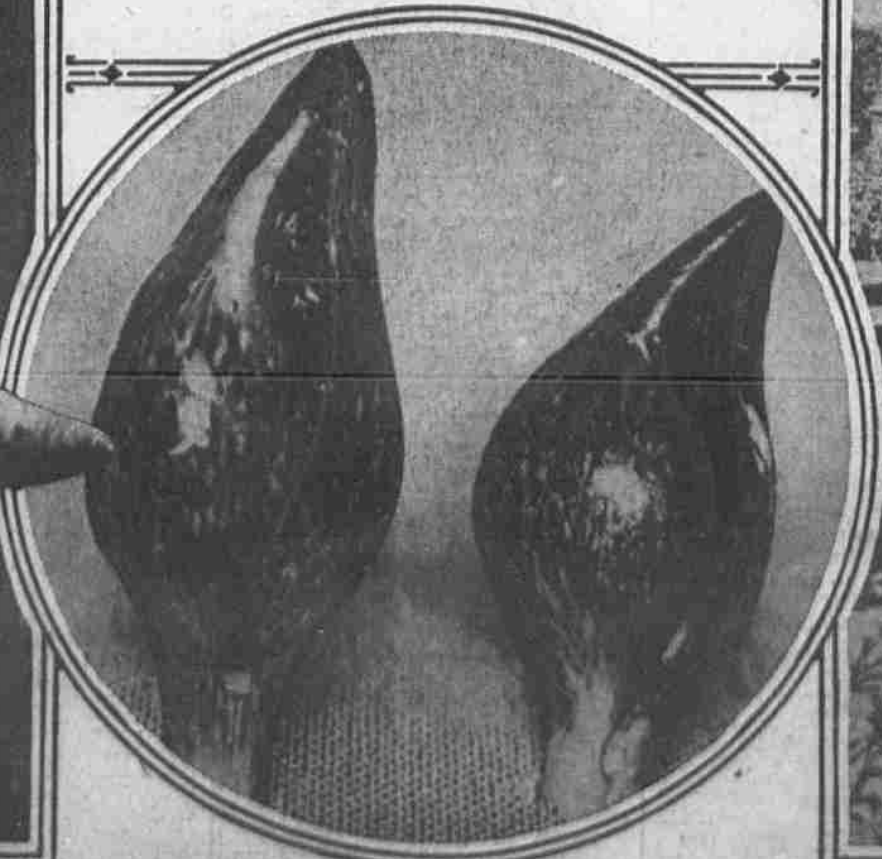
A PAUSE FOR BREATH AND A WAVE
