U. S. AID DECLINED IN LABOR DISPUTE

Colorado Fuel & Iron Co. Refuses to Accept Mediator Offer of President's Board.

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—The Colorado Fuel and Iron Company today served public notice on the Low Mediation Commission, appointed by President Wilson, that the company would settle its own labor difficulties.

Welborn made no direct answer to the commission's offer to suggest plans for settling labor disputes. His reply called attention to the fact that the company had appointed its own mediator to arbitrate differences with employees.
