

MR. RAINS KEEPS TAB ON CITY'S GREAT FOR A CONSIDERATION Schedule of Rates for Write-ups Ranges From \$100 Down to a Modest "V." According to Client's Purse.

His Publicity Methods Spare "Big" Men Annoyance and Sometimes Expand Their Importance as Pillars of the Community.

Introducing J. Lewis Rains, of the Advance Press Service Association. Possibly Mr. Rains doesn't require introduction into the homes of prominent families. He confessed modestly today that his name was known to many Philadelphians who represent wealth and society.

Mr. Rains' specialty is to make "big men" more famous than they actually are. He frankly admitted that was his business. As for prices, Mr. Rains said he would take anything from a \$100 bill down to 15.

In canvassing prospective clients Mr. Rains discusses his ability, power and journalistic influence to keep merchant princes, statesmen and brokers in the limelight. He insists that he is not a follower of Colonel George Mann, of New York, who years ago inaugurated "Pads and Fancies."

Besides being instrumental in obtaining favorable publicity, Mr. Rains, according to a client who recently paid him \$10, promises to keep disagreeable gossip out of the newspapers. Some of the stories referred to by Mr. Rains which he thinks he can keep from being set into type are automobile collisions of the "joy ride" variety.

The headquarters of the Advance Press Service Association is on the third floor of the Plaza Building, 157-79 Arch street. There exist two or three square tables, a roll top desk, a telephone, books of writing paper and four volumes containing a history of Philadelphia.

RAINS PUBLICITY METHODS Invitations to purchase publicity have been extended by Mr. Rains recently to directors of trust companies and railroads. From Samuel Rea, president of the Pennsylvania Railroad, down, every director has been circled. J. A. McCarthy, a ship broker, with offices in the Lafayette Building, at 5th and Chestnut streets, was recently canvassed by Mr. Rains, who called on him after a letter had been received by Mr. McCarthy.

According to Mr. McCarthy, Mr. Rains informed him that he represented an organization which had the support of many reputable newspaper publishers and reporters in Philadelphia. "I have been referred to see you by certain people in Washington," said Mr. Rains.

Mr. Rains told Mr. McCarthy that he was in a position to publish favorable stories about him in the newspapers. He also said he would have Mr. McCarthy's photograph taken and keep it on file in his office until some newspaper or magazine sent for it to be published.

The Finance Committee of Councils reported favorably a bill providing for the purchase from the Pennsylvania Railroad Company at a cost of \$75,000, a tract of land bounded by 32d, 33d, Cuthbert streets and Lancaster Avenue as a site for an armory for National Guardsmen.

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COUNCILS GAINS TIME BY COURT DECISION IN WAR ON HOUSING CODE

Judge Martin Grants Extension Until April 5 for Compliance With Order to Appropriate Funds in Accordance With Law. Philadelphia's housing code, embodied in a law enacted by the Legislature of 1912, which would bring light and air into dingy, ill-ventilated tenement houses is deadlocked again. Judge Martin, in Court of Common Pleas No. 5, today granted John H. Fow, representing both branches of Councils, an extension of time until April 5 on the mandamus writ issued by Judge Ralston a month ago ordering Councils to appropriate funds for the new Division of Housing and Sanitation.
