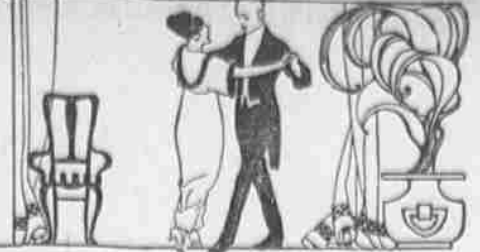


Social and Personal
