

STOCKS WEAK ON FOREIGN SELLING

Majority of Liquidating Orders Came From Holland for German Account.

NEW YORK, March 6.—On profit-taking sales and liquidation from Europe the stock market was irregular today. Prices at the opening showed small recessions from the final of yesterday, but the undercurrent appeared to be good. As soon as any stock was offered it was promptly taken and this gave the impression that there was accumulation of stock by investors and others who were encouraged by the sharp upward swing in the late trading yesterday.

The market remained irregular until a few minutes before the close, when weakness developed on heavier profit taking and larger offerings of European-held American stocks.
