Running, Whether Long or Short Distance, First Active Step to Take in Training for Field of Sports.

ARTICLE III.

Once a youth decides to become an athlete, and it is granted he possesses good health, one of the first requisites is to determine which events are best suited to him. This is a question which the novice should not undertake to answer. Physical make-up, the known powers of endurance, and other peculiar qualities must be studied before he is urged to try special stunts. Even then it will be difficult to designate this or that specialty. The safest course to pursue is to forget about specialities for the present and try to get yourself out "all around." Then you should weigh judgment with experienced athletic friends. Their views will be valuable, but you are the best judge after all.

There is no gauge to follow when the question developed, "What events should I select?" You must pick out two men who in stature and muscular development appear to be ideally suited to the sport. You must pick out one or two events which you are particularly fond of. What is good for one man may be good for another. This is particularly true of track and field athletics.
