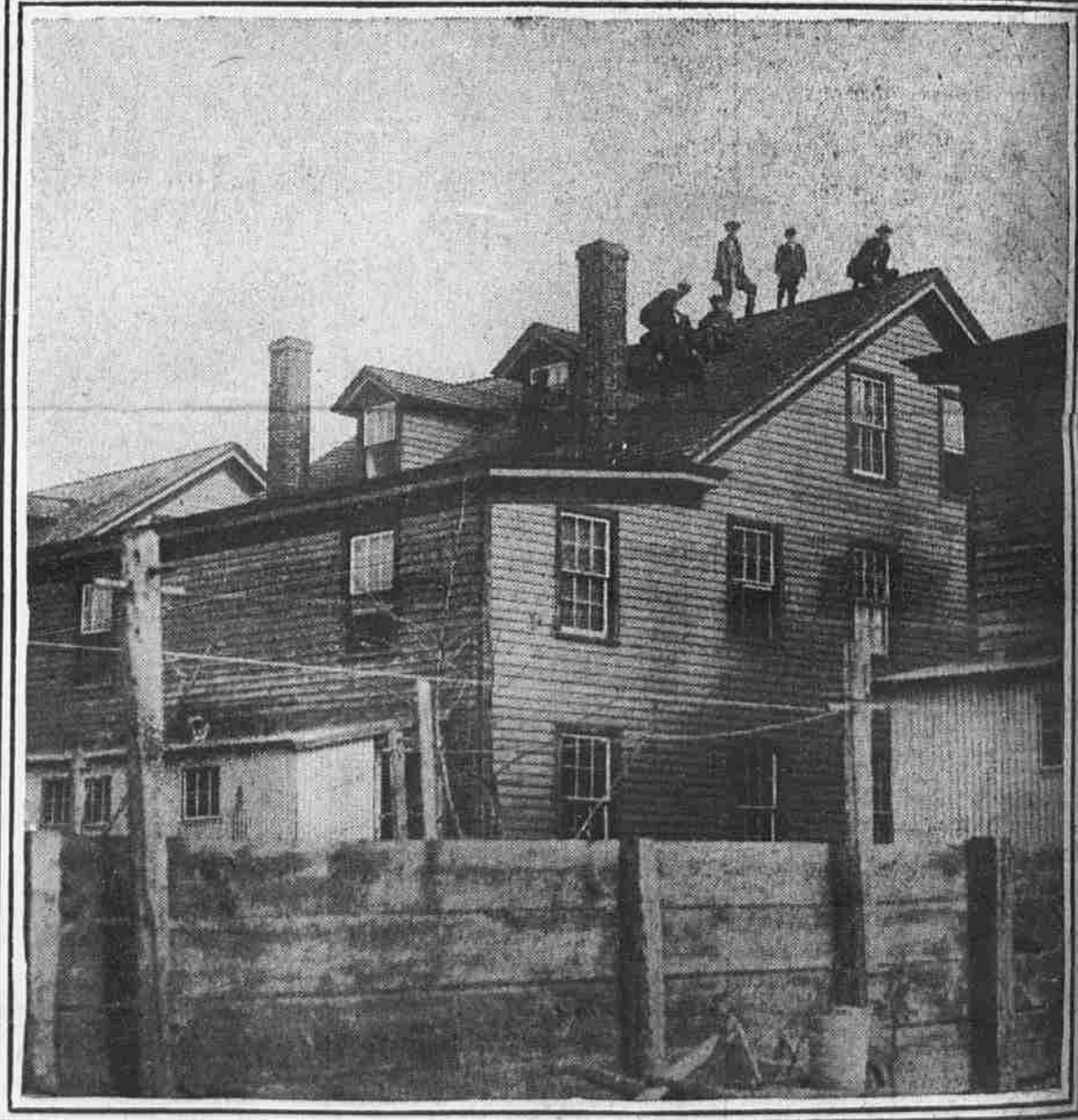
THE PLOWMAN FIELDWARD WENDS HIS WAY

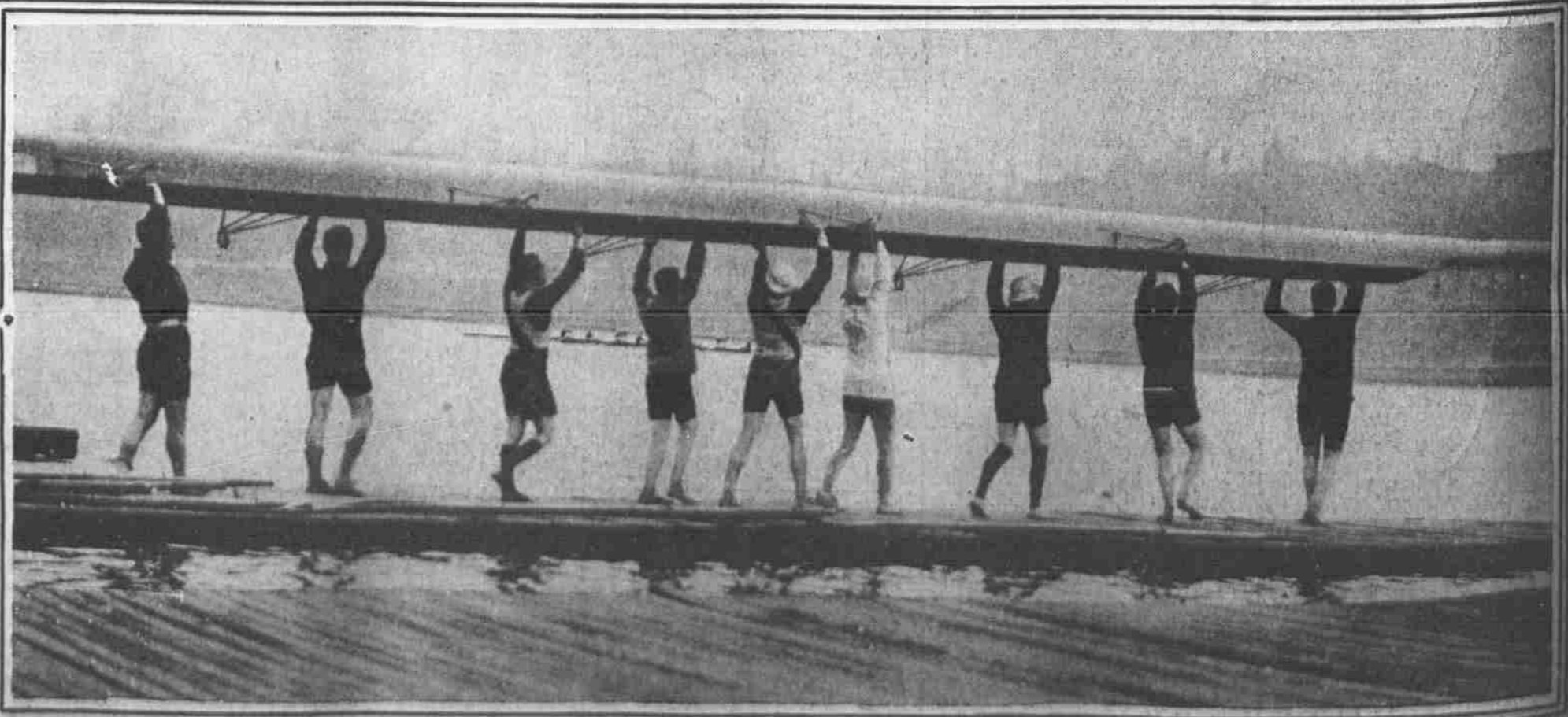


A SIDELIGHT ON THE SMALLPOX SCARE
