## CHRISTIAN LEAGUE

Three Hundred Plan Co-operation in Religious Work Among Female Employes.

A permanent organization of Christian business women, to be known as the Business Women's League of Philadelphia, is one of the outgrowths of the "Billy" Bunday campaign. Definite plans for the establishment of such a league wers made at a meeting in Westminster Ithit last night. It is proposed to have club headquarters to accommodate about 2000 girls and women, and the members are to co-operate to carry on religious work among the female employes of downtown offices, stores and other places. There are about 700 names of prospective members listed already.

There were about 200 women present at last night's meeting. Addresses were made in the interests of the movement by Mrs. E. Boyd Weltzel and Mrs. Edwin C. Grice, who had charge of the work for the local committee among business women during the campaign. It is planned to have the club rooms equipped with cook-ing utersils and meals will be served the working girls at the noon hour. Flooms will also be set aside for prayer meetings and Bible classes for groups representing the workers from different stores, firms and office buildings.

William A. Shelly, 32 years old, a native of Dallas, Tex., soldier of fortune and a sallor, spoke these words today when he was released by the immigration authorities on the charge of coming to this port as a stowaway. Shelly arrived here on the British steamer Southgate from Las Palamos, Canary Islands, Before the vessel, which carried a cargo of grain, left Las Palamos, he succeeded in hiding himself aboard the ship. He was discovered three days after the vessel was out at sea.

Captain Ransdall, of the Southgate, put Shelly to work in cleaning up the deck.
When the vessel reached here he was turned over to the immigration authori-

turned over to the immigration authorities. As Shelly is an American citizen and had worked aboard the ship during the vorage he was released.

"I went abroad to fight with the Allies," and Shelly today, "but decided to return because I didn't find things across the ocean exciting enough for me. I like to hear bullets buzz around me. When I hear bullets it's a treat for me. It was different in Mexico. That's the place for bullets. You can hear bullets every second. I am going back to Mexico."

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
