The Johnson ad-herents refuse to give the odds the followers of Willard want. They are willing to wager on the cham-pion at 3 to 2, but refuse to make any bets of odds better than that

Npure. Williard's followers, however, are holding out for 2 to 1 or better. Four race track gamblers, unable to get better than 5 to 2 for their money, have cabled \$10,000 to New York to bet an Johnson if they can get odds of 3 to 2 of 3 to 2. The ticket sale is sprucing up, but

Fight fans who believe Jack Johnson will successfully defend his heavyweight championship title against Jess Willard at Havana Monday afternoon base their fredictions on this argument:

If the white man bus any chance what-ever of winning the title from Johnson, why is the champion a 2 to 1 and a 2% to 1 favorite in the betting? No matter how logical or legitimate the

duestion may meen, it must be remem-bered that, in previous world's champion-ship matches, disregarding the condition of the titleholder, the contender in all cases has been on the short end of the betting. In figuring bets on a fight-or, in fact, any sport-it seems to be customary for backers of the champion to lay odds. Back in '32, September 7 of that year. to be exact, James J. Corbett knocked out John L. Sullivan in the 21st round at New Orleans. Corbett, a much younger, stronger and considered to be the cleverest heavyweight in the world at the time, was pitted against a "has been," as it were, a man who did not have the patence to get into shape. He was fat and fabby and in no condition to fight at all. Gamblers knew this. Still they placed olds on Sullivan to win. Why? Sullivan was the champion.

The next time the title changed hands was at Carson City, Nev., March 17, 1897. Five years of prosperity had told on Cor-bett. He had loat all of his cunning which won for him over Sullivan. Gentle-man Jim did not have a punch-that was proved in his fight with Sullivan. The latter dropped from sheer exhaustion in the 92 bout. And once again the title bolder was

backed as the favorite over the con-tender, Bob Fitzsimmons, a terrific hit-ter and reputed to be able to kill an ox with one punch, was Corbett's opponent Fitzalmmons' punching ability was not considered in the betting. He was the contender and short adds were placed on him. Corbett lasted less than 14 rounds. Pitzsimmons making the solar plexus punch farmous by knocking out his opponent by that route. Then came James J. Jeffries, the great-

est fighter who over put on a glove. He had been knocking his opponents out with a regularity in the West walle Fitzsin mons was engaging in theatrical work. The latter continued his foolight stunts until a week or two before his match with Jeffries at Coney Island, Novento defend his laurels; null he was the prime ringside favorite. 
