#### ARTISTS ENTERTAIN

Masque of Primitive Peoples Will Be Given Tonight at Horticultural Hall.

The seven art organizations which will present the "Masque of the Primitive Peoples" in Horticultural Hall tonight include the Fellowship of the Academy of the Fine Arts, T-Square Club, Pennsylvania Museum School of Industrial Art, Plastic Club, Sketch Club, Art Club and School of Design for Women. The description of the affair can best be told in the invitations issued, which read as follows: "The Purpose of this billet, Gentle Reader, is to crave most courteously the Honour of your Presence at a most unusualle Entertainment to be given at the 3d Quarter of the Moon-which being translated, means Tuesday, April 6th, at 8 o'clock- and at the Hall of Horticulture, which is in Broad st., nr. Locust. On this occasion the Spirits of the Pagan Past will return againe to earth, and disport themselves, masque fashion, for your Delectation. There will be Scenery most weird and gorgeous with Dances barbaric, and Music and Costumes which shall entrance you by their richness. Here you will see old Ramesis and his train fresh come from the Pyramids under the care of the Fellowship of the Academy of the Fine Arts. Or do you prefer America? Have patience-in a trice the scene will change to Mexico and the Aztecs, redone by the T-Square Club. If your fancy craves Byzantium, it shall be at your beckoning with the help of the Pennsylvania Museum School of Industrial Art; or China and its Mandarins and the whole civilization of Cathay directed by the ladies of the Plastic Club. There, too, will appear the Indians of the West, shown to you in their original civilization, and without circus tawdriness, by the Sketch Club. Yet again Imperial Pome-you have it anew with all the resource that the Art Club has at its disposal; and lastly the Occult civilization of Persia, which shall come to you with the School of Design.

"In 2 or 3 turns of the Hour Glass you will travel to the uttermost parts of the earth, and into the very pit of Time, all in goodlest company. And when the Masque is finished there will be Dancing until the morning hours, when you may clasp the hand of Araby and Egypt and show them a thing or two of our modern foot flinging."

John Frederick Lewis is honorary chairman. and the Honorary Committee includes Mrs. Cornellus Stevenson, Miss Violet Oakley, Miss Emily Sartain, Miss Cecilia Beaux, Miss Harriet Sartain, Lealie W. In selecting Persia as the theme for its portion of the Masque of Primitive Peoples the School of Design for Women opened up large possibilities, and has carried them out wonderfully well. "The Doom of Jemshid," as the episode is called, has been adapted by Mrs. W. Yorke Stevenson from the Shad Nameh, by Firdaust, the most famous poet of Persia, who wrote in the latter part of the 10th century. Mrs. C. Shillard-Smith, a director of the School of Design, has had charge of the production, assisted by Miss Lucile Howard, the artist. Special music has been written by Hedda van der Beemt, and Stanley Muschamp is musical director of the entire Masque.

Among the Plays and Players Club members in the cast are Miss Sarah Uytendale Baird. who takes the part of Princess Zabulistan, Joseph A. Deering, Jr., as Jemshid, the exiled King, and Henry B. Schaffer, Jr., as the High Priest. Miss Eleanor Dougherty will give her mystic "Lotus Dance," which was criticised so favorably at Mrs. W. Yorke Stevenson's Plastic Club affair recently.

A combination of the stars of the Plays and Players in the speaking parts and the artistic designing and making of costume and scenery by the students of the School of Design, with a chorus of 40 of the girls, should be expected to produce a strikingly effective result. And the dress rehearsal yesterday proved such an effect. The well-defined and gorgeous color scheme of costume and scenes, all strictly copled from the ancient Persian, add much to the beauty and music of the lines taken from the lyric of the post, Firdausi, the Homer of the

For the past week the Art Gallery and class rooms of the School of Design have resembled dresamaking establishments and scene painting workshops. Every detail of scenes and costumes has been worked out faithfully by the students, in accordance with recognized authorities on ancient Assyria and Persia. Although Firdausi was more or less recent, this poem was about the reign and fall of Jemshid, a mythical King of early Persia. One scene will contain a beautiful reproduction of a curtain depicting the Hypostyle of Xerxes, in Persepolis, once a chief city of Persia, as drawn by Chipicz. In the first act the colors are rich and gorgeous, red, green, black, gold and purple, but the second scene will be in strong contrast, a delicate com-

bination of pale blue and gold. The story itself is one of intense interest, relating the misfortunes of Jemshid, the great mythical ruler of Persia, who, after a successful reign of 700 years, became vainglorious and implous, and proclaimed himself the mightiest power in the universe. Priests and people turn from him, and he is dethroned and escapes to wander alone and miserable. The second scene finds him in the Kingdom of Zabulistan, where he meets the beautiful Princess who is destined to marry him. His happiness is short-lived, however, as the King of Zabulistan returns him bound to Zohak, who then reigns in Jemshid's former kingdom, and he is doomed to die. Warriors, cup bearers, demons and dancers add picturesque background and action. Special dances are executed by Miss Elizabeth Rountree and Miss Helen Kimmig.

The Fellowship of the Academy of the Fine Arts will represent Egypt.

The Plastic Club will impersonate the people of Cathay and the Mandarins. Bysantium will be shown by the School of Industrial Art.

The Indians of the West will be represented by members of the Sketch Club, and the T-Square Ciub members will represent Mexico and the Astecs.

The Ast Club feature, which was originally announced as "Imperial Rome," has been changed to "The Homeric Age in Greece." The gods and heroes of ancient times, mythical and actual, Ajax, Paris, Helen of Troy and even, it is said, the Horse of Troy, will be part of this

pageant. Dancing for the whole assemblage, actors and audience, will follow the program:
