

BRESSLER OR BUSH WILL FACE BOSTON IN TODAY'S CONTEST

Youthful Probably Mack's Selection Because of Pennoch's Effectiveness in Yesterday's Contest With Red Sox.

After taking the opening game of the series from the Boston Red Sox, the Athletics will engage Carrigan's people again this afternoon at Shibe Park. The success of the initial venture of Mack's disintegrated machine has put new life into the players and hope into the hearts of the Philadelphia fans.

Just whom Connie will call on today to do the main defensive stunts is a matter of guesswork. The chances are, however, that he will use either Rube Bressler or Joe Bush, depending upon whom Carrigan selects from his corps of hurlers.

The splendid performance of Herb Pennock against the invaders from Boston yesterday indicates that Mack is likely to use him again, probably, beyond a single tilt in the battery. Mack will use them in the same positions today as he used yesterday. The new batch of order worked well in the first tilt.

Carrigan also will depend upon the same talent today, excepting, of course, his batters. Harold Janvrin, the young infielder who went to the Red Sox during the latter part of the season of 1913 from the English High School in Boston, is temporarily incapacitated by a sore eye. Pending his return, Tom Heine Wagner, the ex-soldier, will perform around the keystone station. Yesterday Heine shared the same as he did in 1912, when he was one of the leading lights of the Red Sox and assisted them materially to win the American League pennant and then the world's championship from the Giants.

The feature of the first game with Boston was the splendid work of Herb Pennock. Keen Square left-hander just past getting into the Hall of Fame by one scratch hit. Had Harry Hooper gone out in the last inning, Pennock's name would have been embazoned with the chosen few who have gone before him and who have let their opponents down without a single hit. Pennock's work during the spring games indicated that he was going to rise into the class of best hurlers this season. He has always had a lot of stuff. But he has never been quite strong enough physically to go through nine rounds at top speed until this year. At present Pennock weighs more than he ever did and is mighty. Both fighters are from the same district and Italian ring followers are manifesting much interest in the encounter.

Borrell will get a big guarantee with a privilege of a percentage of the gate receipts.

Tomorrow night, at the Quaker City A.A., Jackie Clark, whom Tommy Colucci, finally refused to meet last week, will box Terri Martin, Southwark's veteran, in the star bout.

Gus Christie will have an opportunity Saturday night, to prove whether or not he should be considered a serious contender for the middleweight championship. He has been conditioning considerably for his match with Young Ahern, of New York, at the National A.C.

Scotty Monteth's vision of a 20-round bout between Johnny Dundee and Fred Silcox in the ball park at New Haven, Indiana, with the championship at stake, came to naught, when the chief of police then ruled against the contest. Monteth is positive Dundee can win the title from Welsh. He is ready to make a side bet of any amount of United States currency that Johnny beat the team when they won the game 3 to 0.

In former years the Philadelphia club has played listsless ball, displaying but little pep in times of victory. But it was evident in their first game here that the Phyllies feel that they have better than an even chance to leave Boston with the larger percentage of victories. Homer Tyler or James was ever so effective against the Philadelphians, so the chances seem to favor the visiting team, particularly in the light of their general all-around showing yesterday, when they won the game 3 to 0.

Clever Lew Tandler, of newsboy championship fame, is gradually taking on avordupois and it is probable he will develop into a featherweight when the 1915 boxing season rolls around. Lew's punching powers are improving also.
