Darby Church's Increase Philadelphia, Roxborough and Frankford

Further reports of the effects of the "Billy" Sunday campaign in Philadelphia received from clersymen throughout the effect those published in the Evening Ledon heretofore indicate that the work at the tabernacie continues to bear full. In every section revival campaigns are being held, with unusually large numbers of conversions, and pastors report "rail-hitters" and converts of their own bers of conversions, and pastors report "real-hitters" and converts of their own services actively engaged in leading their friends to find salvation through Jesus Christ. There have been a few discouragins reports, but only a very few. In Darby the results have been especially encouragins. Some of the best evidences of this occurred last Sunday, when 165 new members were received into the First Presbyterian Caurch, of which

the First Presbyterian Caurch, of which the Rev. James B. Kerr is the pastor. The church records have no evidences of anything like this number ever being seeived at one service in the history of

Among the best reports received from Among the best reports received from churches in the city that have not been published comes one from the West York Street Methodist Church. The pastor advised that 154 new members were received aince Mr. Sunday came to Philadelphia and that 10 of these had signed cards at the tabernacle. The indirect results, he said, had been better than the direct. The Rev. W. B. Smith, pastor of the Providence Methodist Church, reports that he has received 69 new members, 24 of whom had taken Mr. Sunday's hand in the tabernacie. At the Dales Memorial United Presbyterian Church, the pastor, the Rev. T. B. Turnbull, has received 69 new members since the campaign started, and S of these had signed cards at the meetings. Mr. Turnbull says: "Doubtless, others were led to make decisions by Mr Sunday, who did not sign cards."

WEST PHILADELPHIA ACTIVE. Special activity is shown in West Philadelphia, particularly north of Market street, from reports received. The Rev. Frank B. Lynch, pastor of the Ebenezer Methodist Church, 52d and Parrish streets, advises that 215 new members have been received into his church since the campage started, besides 28 who united on profession of faith and by letter. From Frankford comes the information from the Rev. J. Waiter Ligglit, pastor of the Seventh United Presbyterian Church, that virtually all those persons whose tabernacle cards had been turned over to him had united with the church and identified themselves with its activities. He says that the men's class in the Bible school has doubled in membership, and while not all of these have "hit the trail," he expects them to do so scon. Since the campaign opened .7 new members were received into this church.

CENTRAL TRUTH OF TOMORROW'S LESSON (April 18, 1915-International Series-23d Psalm.)

Followship and Fellowship By GEORGE G. DOWEY

Happy is the man who can sing this psalm of psalms from the depths of his heart. In childhood we memorized it, along with Lincoln's Gettynburg speech, as one of the classic gems of literature. In manhood we are challenged to make its philosophy the rule of our lives

-it is the philosophy of faith in an unseen God. This psalm was written by David, a man whose life experiences were more varied than the winds. He soured to the greatest heights of regal splendor and achievement and spiritual ecstasy; he sank to the deepest depths of despair-sin, sorrow, poverty, persecution, faithless friends, were all his lot. He ran the full gamut from shepherd's staff to kingly sceptre; he had more experiences than the average life is allowed. And out of this great heart of experience comes this matchless

song of faith in an unseen but unfailing Jehovah. .The central truth is in the first verse-"The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want." A shepherd is one to be followed by the sheep; the sheep then will be "fellowed" by the shepherd. All that this fellowship of the

shepherd implies is enumerated in the rest of the psalm. It means provision, guidance, protection, comfort, all the human needs for time and eternity supplied. But the shepherd's fellowship is conditioned upon the sheep's followship.

Sometimes it means to follow down into death's dark valley of trial, where the "green pastures and still waters" are not seen, where there is so "prepared table of plenty," and where the angels of "goodness and seem so far away. Soul, can you sing in this dark valley "The Lord is my Shaphord"?

We once know of a man who, in direct poverty of earthly goods-coalbin, purse and bread box empty, and without prospect of human aid-sang secostly "The Lord is my Shepherd; I shall not want." He was a problem to well-fed infidels around him. He enjoyed an experience of fellowship unknien to them.
