COUNT VON HOLNSTEIN, WHO MARRIED PHILADELPHIA GIRL, WITH HIS REGIMENT

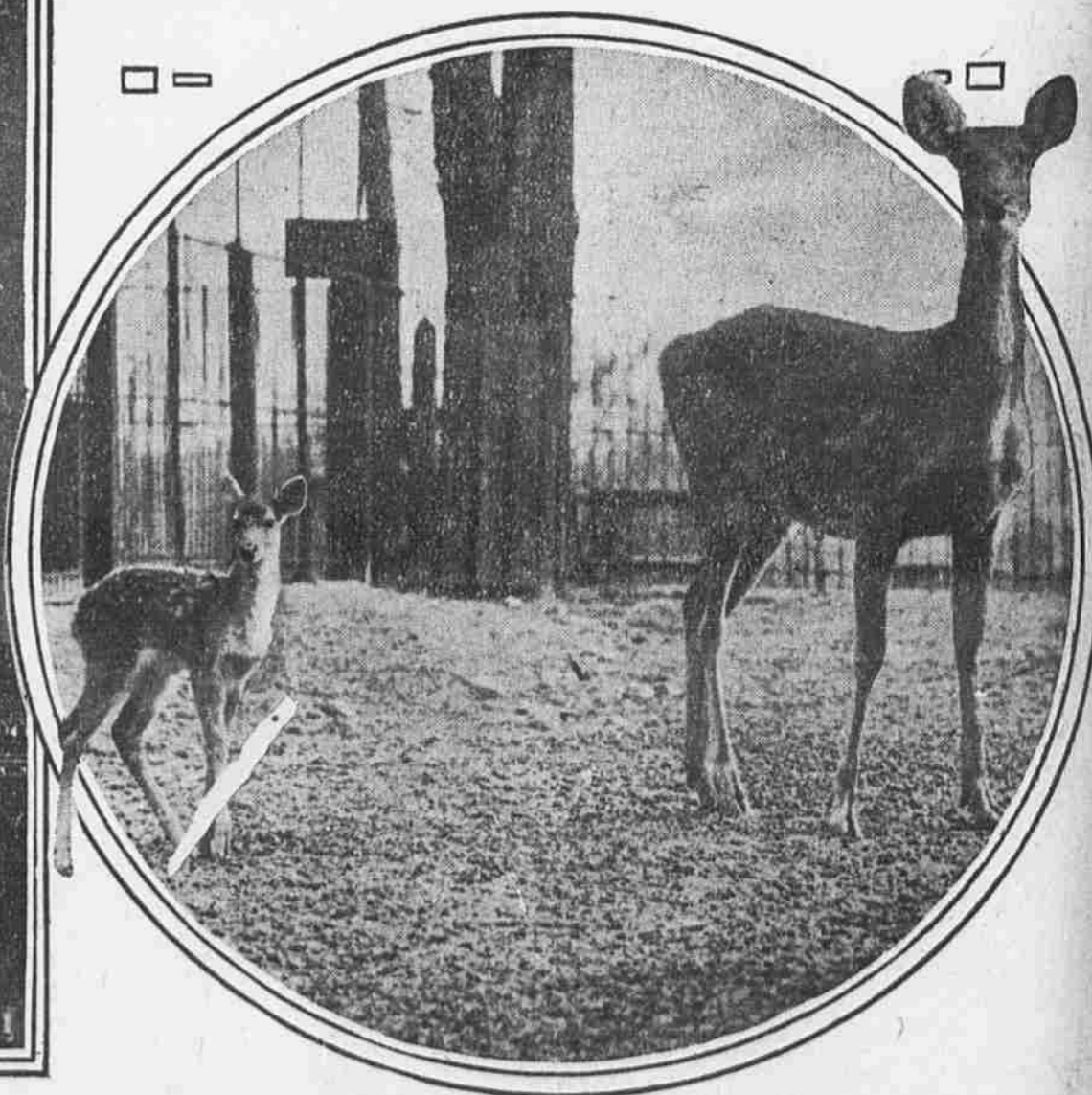

Mrs. Marguerite Hopkins, of Washington, D. C., disappointed in her recent marriage, says, "The average American man is not worth while." She's going on the stage.



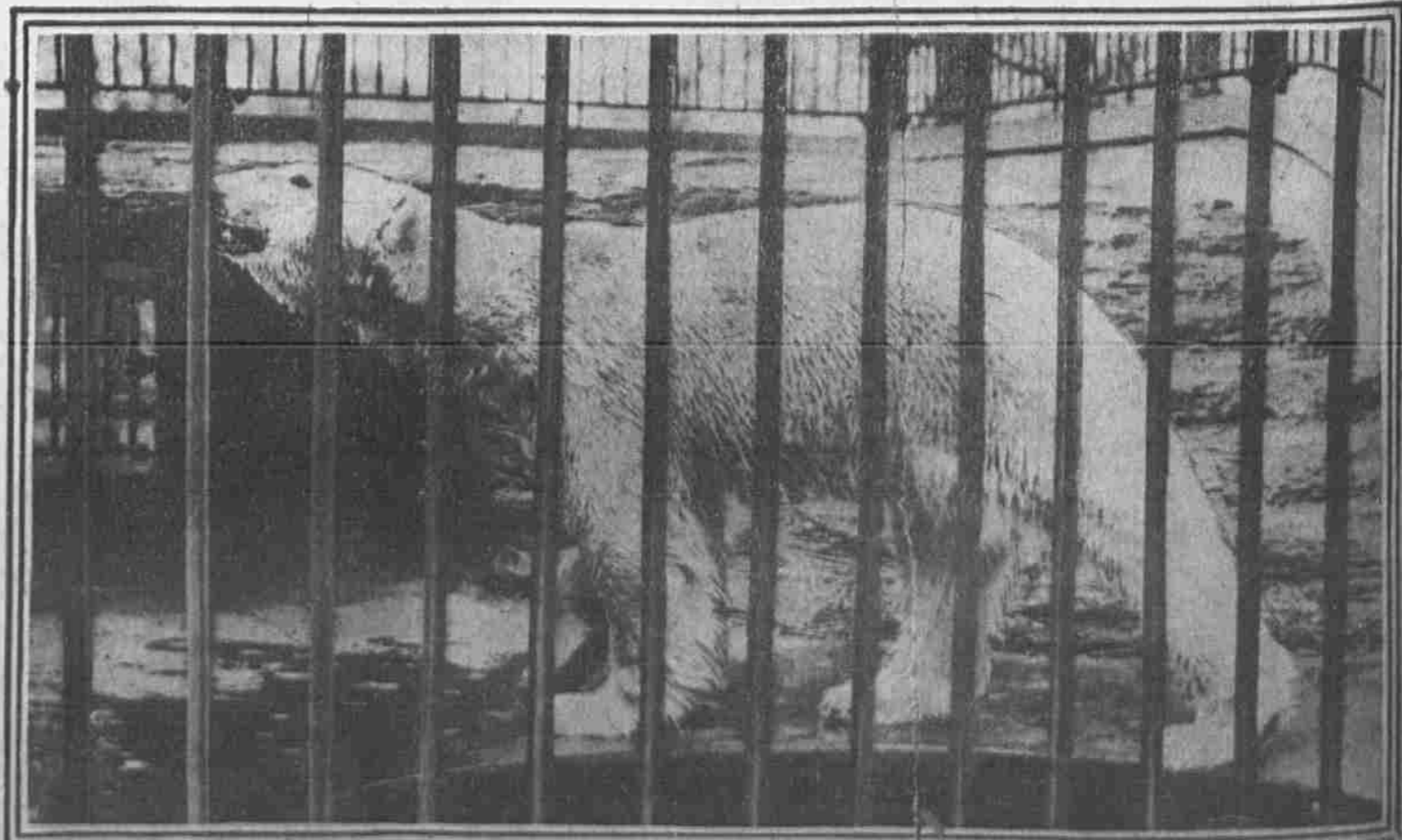
THE CHILDREN SAY HE'S A DEAR
